IN THE UNITED STATES. Magazine arms in the United States have not thus far achieved complete success in the tests to which they have been submitted by the government, although their ultimate superiority can hardly be doubted. Not long ago, issues of two leading magazine rifles were made to a certain number of organizations throughout the army, in many regiments and departments, and trials of them were made in competition with the Springfield single londer. The commanding officer of each detachment making these trials drew up a report of the results, with his comments thereon. It was found that in a large majority of the reports the existing single breech loader was preferred. Nevertheless, the principal faults noted in the nagazine arms were such as can be remedied by mechanical improvements or by a careful training of the men in their use. The brief report of Gen. Benet on the trials, rendered a few months ago, declared that he believed that a magazine gun would eventually be adopted, but that the time had not yet come

Meanwhile in Europe the movement in favor of the new system has been going on and has already practically been pushed to success.
