THE LABOR INTERESTS FOR BRENNAN.

There are many signs that the Democratic State candidates are acceptable to the conservative labor interests of Pennsylvania. In the last number of the *Labour Tribune*, published in Pittsburgh by Thos. A. Armstrong, the Labor candidate for governor in 1882, the Democratic State platform is commended for its "emphatic declarations in favor of the enforcement of the corporation articles of the constitution."

The same journal also speaks of Chauncey F. Black as being "well known as a citizen whose public utterances have been strongly in this direction."

In its department of "Coal Matters" the *Tribune* says:

"The nomination of William J. Brennan for auditor general of this State, by the Democratic convention last week, was a meritorious act, and one which we believe the miners of the State will not forget to reciprocate. It would seem to us as if such auspicious omens ought to cheer us on to make a manly effort to have him elected. Mr. Brennan has always been a true friend of the miners, and if they can be instrumental in having him elected they will wield a power in politics they have never had before—a power which the miners in this State badly need. They have been deprived of rights they never would have been deprived of had they concerted their forces upon their friends."

Although the Democratic ticket starts in Black at the top and finally gets to Africa, yet it is such a white man's ticket that any Black man or colored man can vote for it.

THE SCULLING RACES.

Hanlan Runn Away from Courtney With-out Difficulty.

New York, Sept. 2.—The single scull match for a purse of \$2,000, between Edward Hanlan and Charles E. Courtney, three miles with a turn, was decided yesterday afternoon on Jamaica bay, Long Island, and resulted in an easy victory for Hanlan. It was estimated that fully 15,000 people witnessed the contest. What little betting there was done went at the odds of 2100 to 400 on Hanlan. Ex-Senator J. M. Oakley, of Long Island, was referee. Hanlan rowed in a cedar boat, 31 feet 11-1/2 inches in length, and weighing 29-1/2 pounds. Courtney rowed in a paper boat, 32 feet long, and weighing 30 pounds. Hanlan was the first to appear for the race. Courtney followed a few minutes later. Both were sculling apparatus as they paddled to the starting point. After the course had been cleared of row-boats and other craft the contestants were ordered to get ready, Courtney being on the inside. When the referee gave the word "go" Hanlan was the first to catch the water and soon showed a few feet in front. After going about one-third of a mile Hanlan was leading by nearly a length. Up to this time Hanlan had been rowing thirty-one strokes to the minute and Courtney thirty. At the big hotel dock Hanlan held a two lengths lead and turned the stake boat seven seconds ahead of his opponent. When fairly on the home stretch the race became simply a procession, Hanlan rowing in the easiest possible manner and leading by six lengths. When opposite the Seaside hotel Hanlan stopped rowing, and in response to the applause of the spectators raised his cap several times. He finally won the race by ten lengths. The winner's time was given out by the official time keeper as 19m. 22-1/4s.; Courtney 30 seconds later. Courtney said after the race that he was fairly beaten. Hanlan's backer will now challenge Beach to a single scull race on the Tye, England, for a stake of \$5,000 a side.

The time given for the race beats Hanlan's record against time for three-quarters of a second, and Gaudaur's record in a match by 31 3/4 seconds. Timekeeper M. F. Davis (Hanlan's boatbuilder) says he will make affidavit that he took the time correctly. Yet neither courtney nor Courtney was very angry, and the race appeared to be a mere exhibition.

The Teemer-Beach Race.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—The weather was brilliant and the tide fast, with a light breeze, which scarcely rippled the water. The crowd was the largest that ever assembled on the banks of the Thames to witness a race. Both men made their appearance on the river in their boats punctually at the time announced, but the start was delayed owing to the numerous craft crowding the river. Teemer started off with thirty-eight strokes to the minute, and was the quickest in starting. Beach rowing thirty-eight strokes almost instantly caught him and quickly forged ahead. At Duke's Head Beach led Teemer half a length, and at Walden's the former was two lengths ahead. Teemer here spurred, and with the utmost gameness endeavored to overtake his opponent but without avail. Beach without increasing his rate of strokes kept the advantage, leading four lengths at Hammersmith, where Teemer was rowing a hopeless stem race, but still pluckily doing his best. From Hammersmith Beach paddled home with consummate ease, winning the race by ten lengths. Prominent rowing authorities declare that Beach is the greatest sculler ever seen in England. He looked as though he could row ten miles at racing speed. The betting at the start was 2 to 1 on Beach, and was 50 to 1 on him at Hammersmith. Beach's time was 22m. 53s.

Belfast's Sunday Fight.

BELFAST, Sept. 6.—A mob attacked and severely beat four policemen at Ballymacarrett, a suburb of Belfast, yesterday. The policemen broke away from the crowd, and took refuge in a house. The mob followed them, and in their efforts to recapture the policemen completely wrecked the house. Fortunately for the policemen, the military arrived on the spot in season to rescue them and scatter the mob. Two of the leaders of the rioters were arrested. An Orange funeral was attacked by Catholics, and the procession severely stoned. The Orangemen broke ranks and retaliated upon the Catholics, seriously injuring several of them. The police quelled the disorder, and drove the Catholic party away.

Fishermen's Luck.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Sept. 6.—The schooner *Peregrine*, which has arrived from the Banks, reports the loss of four men on Aug. 23, who went away while attending trawl. She brings home Charles Wilson, a wounded seaman of the schooner *Augusta H. Johnson*. The *Peregrine* lost her jibboom and the sustained other damage. The schooners *Molly Adams* and *Beaver* arrived yesterday. The *Nasdaq* brings a cargo of 450 barrels of mackerel and the *Adams* 670 barrels. The latter's cargo is the largest landed here this season.

They Sustain Each Other.

BOSTON, Sept. 6.—At a special meeting the Boston Clothing Cutters and Trimmers' union voted unanimously to sustain the action taken by the cutters of New York, and that no member of the union should go to work in said city, nor cut any goods that may be sent there, nor work for any manufacturer who may start the same in this city; also that a committee of three be appointed to draft suitable resolutions, and that they be sent to the New York Clothing Cutters' union.

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—H. W. Nicola, manager of the German department of the Standard Accident Insurance company, was arrested at his home in Lake View last night charged with embezzling \$1,000 from the Western Accident Insurance company, where he was formerly employed. He gave bond in \$2,000.

To Empty a Canal.

St. CATHARINE'S, Ont., Sept. 4.—It is reported that the government intends to draw the water out of the Welland Canal. There is great excitement, as such action would result in throwing 2,600 men out of employment.
