



NOTICE TO QUIT THE TOWN Key West Citizens Get Tired of Their Cuban Visitors.

KEY WEST, March 13 .- A band of elven Cuban outlaws landed here from Tamps last night. Eight left town as soon as they received notice to do so from the citizens' committee. Of the remaining three, Emilia Garcia surrendered himself to the sheriff. Pedro Ojas was arrested at the instance of the state's attorney and locked up in jail, and Ramon Rubiera asked the committee to make a fuller examination into his case The committee granted his request, but finally informed Rubiers that he must go, which he immediately agreed to do if the committee would give their reasons for insisting on his departure in writing. This was willingly and promptly done. The no-tice given by the committee was:

We are here as representatives of the good people of the community to say that we intend to have order, peace and quiet prevail in our midst, and to give notice that all disturbers and agitators must leave immediately and without further notice. If you are peaceful and law-abiding, and wish to remain in our midst and pursue a legitimate avocation or business, we will see that you are protected and in no way disturbed. But if you remain you must conform to our laws and customs. We know the agitators and disturbers, and if they remain after this notice they must able the consequences.

The committe, which consisted of fifteen persons, was appointed at a meeting of citizens held on last Tuesday for the purpose of devising some means of ridding the community of this band of desperadoes. It received full power to adopt such measures as it saw fit. The committee visited the headquarters of the disturbing faction and informed the men that they were known to be outlaws and black-mailers and ordered them to leave. Hence, their exit. Two of the band are in jail here.

American Caught Fish Free. WASHINGTON, March 13 .- In a letter to the collector at Eastport, acting Secretary Fairchild says that fish caught by Canadian fishermen and transferred to American boats, are not the product of American fisheries, and are, therefore, not entitled to free entry. Fish, however, caught and ment instructions by American citizens, whether non-residents or otherwise, are

landed under the rule laid down in departequally entitled to free entry, and it is immaterial that other governments may also claim these persons as subjects, provided the statute of such persons fulfils the conditions of the United States confering citizenship.

The warrant was served at midnight, and Mr. Huling gave \$300 bonds to appear before a justice to-

Concerning the Emperor Wiffiam. BERLIN, March 14.-The emperor and empress gave a farewell audience to M. de Lesseps. The emperor afterward received the mayor of Berlin, Prof. Braun and Count Herbert Bismarck, and drove out later. It is reported that on his birthday the emperor will give a personal reception to members of royal families only.
