Professor S. A. Lattimore, analyst of the New York State Board of Health, upon analyzing water from this well, found it more deadly than the city sewage!

The filling up of the old well stopped the ravages of the disease.

Not long since the writer noticed while some men were making an excavation for a large building, a stratum of dark colored earth running from near the surface to hard pan. There it took another course toward a well near at hand. The water from this well had for years been tainted with the drainings from a receiving vault, the percolations of which had discolored the earth!

Terrible! A similar condition of things exists in every village and city where well water is used, and though the filterthrough the earth may give them a disease remains, though the water may look never so clear.

It is still worse with the farmer, forthe drainage from the barn yard and the slops from the kitchen eventually find their way into the family well!

The same condition of things exists in our large citles, whose water supplies are rivers fed by little streams that carry off the filth and drainage ually drunk by rich and poor alike with great evil.

Some cautious people resort to the filter for purifying this water, but even the filter does not remove this poison, for water of the most deadly character may pass through this filter and become clear, yet the poison disguised is there. They who use filters know that they

## FARM NOTES.

FARMYARD MANURE. --- The composition of the manure made in the barnyard is determined by the character of the animals and the food which they receive. In case of a full-grown animal that is neither gaining or losing in weight, the manure will contain the same amount of nitrogen and ash constituents as were present in the food consumed. The animal is like a machine for the conversion of the princi-pal constituents of the fodder into a more available form for plant food. If an animal is gaining in flesh, producing milk, or growing wool, etc., its manure will be less valuable. The character of food affects the quality of manure. A diet of straw can give only a poor manure, while if the animal has a good supply of rich food, as oil-cake and bran, its manure will be correspondingly rich in nitrogen and ash constituents. Aside from the animal and the food it gets, the value of a manure is governed greatly by the treatment it receives after being dropped, Save the urine.





> THE benefit from the use of gypsum or land plaster, is not exhausted by one application. An experienced farmer says he finds great advantage from throwing a little on corn when it is knee high, and again as it is coming into tassel. The size and fulness of the ears will be increased in this later application on rows side by side with those not plastered and both of which has received a dusting of the fertilizer earlier in the season. A little at a time and often should be the rule with plaster.

THE Sweet Pepper is a neat, upright growing shrub, with light green leaves, fine white flowers, and has a delightful fragrance. It is a native of the New England States, and has for several years attracted the attention of beekeepers as a shrub to furnish bees with honey at a time when flowers are scarce. It can be successfully transplanted, and will grow on all soils from gravely loam to black peat, as well as lime or slate soils.

FEED out the new corn slowly at first, using old corn in preference, so as to allow the new crop to dry and thoroughly ripen. New corn sometimes does injury to stock when fed out too freely, and the proper mode is to begin its use gradually. If the old corn is out give oats with the new corn, with plenty of chopped hay or straw.

SPEAKING of the vitality of seeds from commission men, W. S. Devol, of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, says he has not observed a single instance where a variety from commissioned grocers gave so large a per cent. of germinated seeds as did the same variety put up by the same firm and procured direct from the firm.

THE amount of wool going into consumption in Europe is much larger this year than previously, while the demand in this country is also increasing, which gives an encouraging outlook for wool-growers.

CLEAN out the wells during dry seasons. No matter how well covered they may be, the chances are that toads will be found in them. It is important to have such work done every year if a supply of pure clean water is desired.

GIVE verbenas a rather rich but light soil if you wish to have vigorous plants producing an abundance of large trusses of flowers.
