RHODE ISLAND ELECTIONS.

The Tide Turns Toward the Democrats and

They Win the Legislature. NEWPORT, April 9 .- The second edition of the election, made necessary by a number of districts failing of a choice, has resuited in a democratic victory. The four republican assemblymen who failed of an election on Wednesday went before a mixed convention of republicans and prohibitionists where an effort was made to unite on one set of candidates. Senator Sanborn, republican, desiring harmony and party success, would not run again, and this, in the estimation of the democrats, saved them, for Sanborn is by far the strongest republican here. When it became known that another republican had been nominated for senator in Sanborn's place, the democrats were jubilant, and have carried their enthusiasm to success.

Despite the excitement incident to Wednesday's annual election, nearly a hundred more votes were east. William J. Underwood, democrat, defeated Thomas Coggeshall, republican, for senator, by 36 votes. For the assembly, John H. Crosby, jr. democrat, got 44 more votes than William C. Townsend, republican; Gen. Arnold L. Burdick, democrat, beat W. P. Sheffield, jr., by 43 votes, and Dalton E. Young, democrat, defeated William B. Franklin, republican-prohibitionist, by 149 votes.

The democrats are wildly celebrating their victory. Such a one has not been theirs for thirty years. Both parties fought bravely. The democrats in joint legislative convention, will now elect Honey lieutenant-governor and McGuinness secretary of state, and will probably turn out judges, clerks and sheriffs all through the state.

East Greenwich elects one democratic representative and Warwick one republican representative, making the senate stand 19 republicans and 15 democrats, and the house 28 republicans and 41 democrats, or 47 to 56 in grand committee in favor of the democrats.

MR. BLAINE MUCH BETTER.

Slight Broncho-Pneumonia, but his Symtoms are Favorable.

ST LOTIS, April 9.-A despatch from Fort Gibson, I.T., says: Mr. Blaine was suffering from a severe cold on Sunday evening last when he arrived at Gibson station. The government ambulance met the party at the station, but only the ladies of the party could be taken to the post. The next morning the ambulance returned for Mr. Blaine. He was able to sit up in the ambulance, but he looked pale and thin. On reaching the post he went to the residence of Col. J. J. Coppinger and has not been out of the house since. Dr. Charles. P. Berne, post surgeon, referred all questioners to Col. Coppinger. The colonel

Mr. Blaine is suffering from a heavy cold. accompanied by remittent fever, and was quite sick, but now has a favorable pulse." CHICAGO, April 10 .-- A despatch was received by Mr. Blaine's sons to the effect that his symptoms were quite favorable, and that neither pneumonia nor typhoid had developed. Mr. Blaine has some fever but his physician is not alarmed. It is be-lieved that Mr. Blaine will be in Chicago some time next week.

Dissatisfied Fishermen.

GLOCCESTER, April 8 .- President Cleveland's letter upon the fisheries situation is received here with much more criticism than favor. It is construed that the president will not resort to retaliatory measures unless under the pressure of an insult or outrage of the grossest description. A veteran democratic shipowner voiced the

general sentiment when he said: "The president practically asks the fishermen of America to sacrifice their great industry for the good of the country, and asks us to patriotically bear with all the insults heaped upon us by Canada. Glou cester fishermen are not unreasonable in their demands. Now all we ask is that the president use the retaliatory power given him by congress when our commercial rights are violated."

Riddled Himself with Buckshot.

PATERSON, April 10 .- Edward Speer, a son of one of the first sheriffs of Passaic county, shot himself at his father's homestead at Athenia, a few miles from this city. The stock of the gun had been fastened to a wooden vise and a string attached to the trigger. He sat close to the gun with the muzzle close to his heart and pulled the string. A large charge of buckshot entered his heart, making a whole large enough to admit a goose egg. Speer fell dead on the floor. The suicide was a cigarmaker. He lived in this city and worked at Passaic. His father is one of the wealthiest men in this county.

Knights of Labor Convention.

HARRISBURG, Pa., April 11 .- The convention of Knights of Labor took up the anthracite coal inspectors bill, which provides for an additional inspector in each district to be appointed by the men. An amendment placing the appointing power in the hands of the governor was defeated and the bill adopted. The Hazelton Mines Hospital bill was endorsed, as was also the bill authorizing the government to appoint special policemen at the request of labor organizations, and the bill making an appropriation to the election of the Wilkesbarre Hospital.

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
