The water was rushing through this in tremendous volume and the ferward bulkheads could not be closed. The vessel was therefore headed for shore, but it soon become evident to the officers that the vessel must sink before the beach could be

reached. When the captain gave the order to get ready the boats the panic among the steerage passengers was renewed. They were perfectly frantic with fear and it took the greater part of the crew to prevent them from seizing on the boats. A number of cabin passengers went in among the Italians and tried to quiet them, but there was no reasoning with them. All that could be done was to keep them together on the afterdeck, a strong guard being placed to prevent them from rushing forward and hindering the work of the sailors.

When the boats touched the water the last vestige of control was swept away. One mad rush swept aside the guard and the Italians came tumbling over each other in their frantic eagerness to secure places in the boats. Women and children were thrown down and trampled upon. But the stronger paid the penalty of their cowardice, for as they got to the front they were pressed by the crowd behind and many fell over into the sea. In this way over forty were drowned, who'if they had been orderly would have been saved.

All the others escaped and were landed near [Anomanches. The place where La Champagne went ashore is not far from land and not in deep water. Most of her cargo will be saved.

The vessel which caused the mischief was the Vil'le Rio, a tramp steamer hailing from South America. She received such serious damage that she was abandoned by her crew and sank shortly after in deep water. She carried no passengers.
