The fraud by which the revenue bill was defeated for want of the signature of the President of the senate, is putting the people of the state in an angry mood and will be a heavy load for the Republicans to carry particularey if the wrong is not righted. The Philadelphia Times remarks: The members of the Legislature have spoken almost with one voice, in favor of meeting to correct the wrong without cost to the State. Representative leaders of both parties have publicly proclaimed that they could accept no pay for a service that is rendered necessary by the want of legislative care, and the assurance must be before the Governor that no appropriation would or could be passed to pay legislative salaries. Indeed, so sharply has public sentiment defined itself on the question, that no legislator could accept pay and continue to command the respect of his constituents. The question of costs is, therefore, practically out of the case; but cost whatever it might, is a great Commonwealth like Pennsylvania to bow to the crime of a lobbyist, confess her inability to correct the wrong or punish the offense, and sit down in childish helplessness while the people must be taxed a million a year as the price of cowardly submission to fraud? Let Governor Beaver dismiss his superserviceable political advisvrs who seem ready to flatter his fears, and test the pulse of people who must pay the million of an nual taxes imposed by the new bill on corporations, and he will hear one universal response demanding that he shall not condone a fraud and that he shall recall the Legislature regardless of cost.

EIGHT MEN INSTANTLY KILLED.

Hurled a Hundred Feet Into the Air and Their Bodies Dushed Upon the Rocks. ALTOONA, June 4 .-- The town of Birmingham, Pa., was the scene of a shocking ac-cident, which involved the death of eight persons. The stone quarries of the Cambria Iron company are situated within 500 yards of the railroad station. In the forenoon the workmen arranged to set off a blast, using three kegs of blasting powder. For some reason the fuse failed to ignite. Clarence Stewart, foreman, and Michael

Solden undertook to remove the tamping. supposing that the powder had escaped through the crevices of the rocks. Stewart was using a steel drill, and its contact with the rock must have struck a spark, which communicated with the powder. In an instant there was an explosion. Men wer hurled a hundred feet into the air and their bodies dashed upon the rocks below. It is believed that no less than fifty carloads of stone were hurled upon the men working below. Two large rocks weighing at least twenty tons each were hurled upon four of the men. The people




