The apprehensions about short crops do not seem to have been well founded. The latest reports are cheering on this subject. In Texas and Alabama the crop prospects are brightened by recent rains.

The church synods are getting to be severe on secret societies of all kinds, and if the resolutions of some of them are put in force, it will be nigh unto as hard for the member of a secret order to get into church membership as for a rich man to get into heaven.

They say that much fear is being entertained on board of the Ems left Blaine's magnetism will knock out the compass and the boat thus be led astray. That would be a great pity, but then, you know, they couldn't have Blaine without his magnetism.

The Republican presidential nomination lies between Blaine and Sherman. At this time the chances are in favor of Blaine, but Sherman is a shrewd campaigner and the months that intervene between this time and the convention may work wonderful changes.

Wilson Waddingham, of New Haven, Conn., recently purchased the Antonio Ortiz grant of 163,000 acres of land situated in San Miguel County, New Mexico. Mr. Waddingham is said to be the largest landed proprietor in the world. He owns in fee 1,500,000 acres, about 500,000 acres more than are claimed by the Duke of Westminster. Henry George should turn his attention to Mr. Waddingham.

Judge Lawrence, of the Supreme Court decides that New York hotel-keepers cannot supply liquors to their guests on Sunday. This is the result of the test cases made up by the hotel proprietors last Sunday. Judge Lawrence holds that in selling liquor on Sundays the hotel-keepers have forfeited their licenses, and have no right now to sell liquor on week-days. His decision applies also to the saloon keepers who hold licenses similar to those granted hotels.

The June crop report just issued by the Department of Agriculture at Washington, shows that while the condition of wheat is not quite as good as in 1886, the increased acreage is likely to make good all shortage. The harvest is already progressing as far north as the thirty-eighth degree of latitude, and unless serious damage should befall the crop from causes now unlooked for, the yield will not be less than four hundred and fifty million bushels with that amount of wheat the year's bread, and a good many loaves to spare for our foreign neighbors, will be well assured.

William Rogers, who was sent to Russia by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, says the World, in the interests of science eighteen years ago, succeeded, it is said, in abstracting from that country the secret of the manufacture of Russia iron. He imparted the knowledge to his son and his nephew at some subsequent period, and the three are now about to establish a mill for the production of that commodity at Freeport, Pa. It will be in order for Congress when it meets to immediately place an extra duty on Russia iron, as it has not been manufactured here before and no one has taken special care to shut it out. Mr. Rogers, having surreptitiously obtained his valuable information and brought it here, of course has the right to control the Russia iron market in the United States and to make people pay more for it than they have been in the habit of paying. Mr. Rogers should not be discriminated against. He has the young-est of the industrial infants.

**QUEEN VICTORIA TO EXHIBIT HERSELF ON JUBILEE DAY.**

SHE WILL RIDE IN AN OPEN CARRIAGE RE-DECKED WITH DIAMONDS AND ARRAYED IN COSTLY ROBES.

London, June 12.—The state carriage will not be used by the queen in the jubilee procession. It was found that it would be impossible for the public to see the queen, as the carriage is a closed one. The queen has therefore ordered that one of the open carriages should be decorated in chocolate and gold, and embellished with the royal arms and crown. In this conveyance she will sit alone on the seat facing the horses, dressed in black satin covered with white lace, having worked upon it the rose, the shamrock and the thistle. Her train will be of black velvet edged with ermine, and she will not assume her robes of state until entering the abbey, as it would be impossible for them to be contained in the carriage owing to their volume. She will not wear her imperial diadem, but a coronet of diamonds of immense value and a lace veil hanging from her widow's cap, which she will wear instead of a bonnet, as a kind of protection to her head. This cap will be literally covered with diamonds. The front of her dress will be almost hidden by the various orders, by her famous pearl necklace, the Koh-i-noor and other valuable jewels. Opposite her majesty will sit the mistress of the robes in her court costume, and possibly the dowager marchioness of Ely, the queen's old and valued friend Lady Jane Churchill another of her majesty's favorite ladies, will not be in attendance on this occasion, but will witness the procession from Devonshire house. The queen has also ordered that as many of the crowned heads and royal princes from abroad as choose to do so shall proceed to the abbey on horseback and in full uniform. The royal carriage will be drawn by the famous six cream-colored horses, caparisoned with gold, and having footmen in rich scarlet and gold court liveries, with powdered hair, running by their sides holding golden cords and tassels attached to the animals' bridles. Fourteen other open carriages like that of the queen's will convey the members of the English royal family and of the household, who, of course, will all be in full court costume.

The dress of the princess of Wales, will according to present arrangements, be of cloth of gold, embroidered with roses, shamrocks and thistles in natural colors. Her royal highness will wear the jewels presented to her on the occasion of her marriage by the city of London. Indeed, the queen herself has determined that it shall eclipse anything of the kind seen since her coronation, very wisely observing the other day to one of her ladies that the people are not going to pay such prices for their seats along the route to be disappointed. It is entirely of her own free will that she has arranged to ride in an open carriage. Already seats are being erected in every direction, and the prices asked for a single chair are fabulous. A gentleman has taken the first floor of Hatchett's hotel and pays £300 for the privilege. Some enterprising person has rented the Waterloo house, in Cockspur street for £600, and will probably make as many thousands by the seats he will let in it.
