

The German merchants, who have so large a stake there, in their appeal to the imperial government, through its consul at Honolula, recapitulate their grievances and fears, probably in the hope that the remedy will suggest itself, and virtually call on their government for relief. Germany's ambition to established colonies will induce her to strive earnestly to secure the protectorate over the fertile Hawaiian group, and it is certain that her claims will be among those most vigorously asserted.

EX-ATTORNEY GEN. SPEED DEAD Only Three Surviving Members Now Left

of Lincola's Two Cabinets.

LOUISVILLE, June 26 .- Ex-Atorney-General James Speed, whose serious illness was announced several weeks ago, died at 3:15 A. M., at his home in this county. For a year past he had suffered much from general debility.

Mr. Speed was born on March 11, 1812, in Jefferson county, Ky., and was graduated at St. Joseph's college. He studied law in the Transylvania university, was admitted to the bar and began the practice of his profession in Louisville. He was elected a member of the legislature of Kentucky in 1847, and a state senator in 1861. In November, 1861, President Lincoln appointed him attorney-general of the United States. Mr. Speed remained in the cabinet until July, 1866, when he resigned the attorney-generalship, and resumed the practice of law. He was president of the loyalists' convention in Philadelphia in 1886.

Mr. Speed had always been a strong republican partisan until in 1884, he repudia-ted the nomination of James G. Blaine and it is understood, supported, although not actively, Mr. Cleveland. INDEFINATELY POSTPONED.

Prisoners Break Jail and Thereby Spoll a Proposed Hanging.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., June 27 .- C. R. Carter, Tom M. Kelton and three other prisoners killed the deputy sheriff and escaped from the jail at Mount Vernon, thirty miles west of here, at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. A reward of \$400 has been offered for Carter's arrest. He was a saloon keeper at Mount Vernon. He was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged at Mount Vernon on next Friday. The crime for which Carter was sentenced was for the murder of Robert Crockett, an old citizen of Lawrence county, on the streets of Mount Vernon in February, 1885. Crockett had been active in reporting violations of the State laws in the whiskey traffic, and this fact, coupled with other circumstances, pointed to Carter, who had been heard to threaten Crockett's life, and to Thomas M.
