THE WEALTHIEST NEGROES.

Some Interesting Facts About Amanda Dixon, the Colored Heiress. AUGUSTA, Ga., July 8.—Since the decision of the supreme court giving to Amanda Dixon, the illegitimate daughter of the late David Dixon of Hancock county, his property, to the amount of \$400,000, it will probably prove of interest to know something of Amanda and her mode of living.

The facts of the case are familiar to the public generally. David Dixon, who was a wealthy planter of Hancock county, after the death of his wife, had cohabited with Julia Dixon, a former slave, by whom he had a number of children, one of whom, who afterward lived with Dixon's friend Eubanks, by whom she had two children. Before his death he gave Julia \$25,000. He died in February, 1885, leaving the bulk of his property, amounting to \$400,000, to Amanda, she to only use the interest on the money and her death it is to go to her two sons.

Her residence is quite a large, double brick house, three stories high, containing some twelve or fifteen rooms, shaded in front by three mammoth oaks, surrounded by a large yard, and, in all, a most desirable residence. She purchased this house about a year ago, and has been living there since in company with her mother, Julia, who is now quite an old woman, and her two sons, one of whom resides in the city.

AMANDA IS AN UNASSUMING, intelligent mulatto, and does not seem at all 'set up' by her singular good fortune. She would not be noticed on the streets from hundreds of other colored women by any display or show of dress. She states that as yet she has no idea what she will do or where she will live in future. She has been advised to come north.

THE REVOLUTION IN HAWAII

Some of Kalakaua's Promises—Two United States Vessels Near Honolulu. SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—The next steamer from Honolulu will arrive on Wednesday of this week, and until then nothing further will be ascertained concerning the revolution in the kingdom of Hawaii.

On the night of June 30 J. S. Walker, auditor-general, and F. S. Pratt, registrar of public accounts, were noticed to carry from the palace a basket filled with documents supposed to have some connection with the present bribery case.

Among King Kalakaua's promises to the citizens' committee were: that the balls given in the palace should be discontinued hereafter; that a reduction in the force of attaches about the palace should be made; that the harpies and hangers-on who have luxuriated for six years should be cleared out and that the would dispend with his Honolulu dancers.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The president and Mrs. Cleveland and Col. Lambert will leave Washington for a stay of about a week in New York state. The party will proceed over the Pennsylvania railroad direct to Holland Patent, where the president will spend Tuesday with Miss Cleveland. On Wednesday he will go to Clinton to attend the centennial celebration of the city in which his father lived.

ALTOONA, Pa., July 9.—The rear car of the Sea Shore express train that left here, bound eastward, Saturday morning, jumped the track a short distance below the depot and was refused. Two passengers were in the car, but all miraculously escaped injury except Mrs. Louis Dender, of this city, and her four-year-old daughter. Their injuries, however, are not of a serious character. The child was found under the car and could not be extricated for some time.

Huntingdon a Good Place to Skip. HUNTINGDON, Pa., July 11.—All the hotel keepers in this city were refused licenses in February last and lately they all signed an agreement to close their places until October, when the supreme court is expected to render a decision in reference to the appeals of the saloon men from the court of quarter sessions, which refused the licenses. They also expressed their hope in the sum of \$600 for the faithful performance of the agreement.

Secretary Lamar's Daughter to be Married. WASHINGTON, July 11.—Cards are out for the marriage of Miss Jennie, daughter of Secretary Lamar, to her cousin, Mr. W. H. Lamar, a young attorney of this city. The ceremony is announced to take place at the old homestead of Mr. Secretary Lamar in Macon, Ga., on the 15th inst. The secretary and a number of friends of the family in this city will attend the wedding.

Distribution of Shad. HARTFORD, Conn., July 11.—Superintendent of State Fisheries Henry Fenton of Paquonock has just completed the distribution of ten million shad in the Connecticut and Housatonic rivers, five millions being given to each.

Death of Charles Merriam. SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 10.—Charles Merriam of the Webster dictionary publishing firm of G. & C. Merriam died at his home in this city.

Sporting Gossip. The Baltimore players do not expect to do better than second place by the end of the season. They say that their only ambition is to keep pushing the St. Louis team. Pitcher Kirby, who was bought last Saturday from Indianapolis by Cleveland, went to Cincinnati and was overcome by the heat and knocked out in the first inning. Arundel of Indianapolis was fined \$600 and costs in the Indiana police court for drunkenness and assault during his recent spree. The management then stepped in and fined him \$100. It is said that the Pittsburg club will make an effort to get back into the American association next season. It is also reported that Detroit will jump over to the American association. Next, the right fielder of the Cincinnati club, is probably one of the smallest men now on the ball field, but when a fly comes over his way he reaches for it in a way that would make a six-footer turn pale.
