The reference to General Boulanger was received with few signs of approval.

The Queen Reviews her Troops, London, July 9.-The Queen reviewed 60,000 soilders at Aldershot. Her majesty was received with great enthusiasm. A large number of stands had been erected at the point of review, and they were all packed with fashionable and aristocratic people. Many volunteers who took part in the review came from a long distance, and travelled all night in order to be present. The whole spectacle was very imposing.

A Priest and His Pistol. PEKIN, Ill., July 10 .- Father Noonan, formerly a priest at St. Joseph's church in this city, has been arrested on a State warrant for flourishing a revolver at John Fitzpatrick and threatening his life. Fitzpatrick, who is a well-to-do bachelor, was married to Noonan's sister by Father Noonan about a week ago. He claims that Noonan was attempting to run his house, and he seriously objected.

A Sinking City. SAN FRANCISCO, July 11 .- The inability of the Comstock superintendent to locate the entombed miners in the Gould & Curry has again directed attention to the fact that Virginia City is fast sinking down upon its wooden supports and crushing the drifts, tunnels and shatts out of their original shape. Some Interesting Facts About Amanda

Dixon, the Colored Heiress. AUGUSTA, Ga., July 8. - Since the decision of the supreme court giving to Amanda Dixon, the illegitimate daughter of the late David Dixon of Hancock county, his property, to the amount of \$400,000, it will probably prove of interest to know some thing of Amanda and her mode of living. The facts of the case are familiar to the public generally. David Dixon, who was a wealthy planter of Hancock county, after the death of his wife, had cohabited with Julia Dixon, a former slave, by whom he had one illegitimate child, Amanda, who afterward lived with Dixon's friend Eubanks, by whom she had two children. Before his death he gave Julia \$25,000. He died in February, 1885, leaving the bulk of his property, amounting to \$400,000, to Amanda. she to only use the interest on the money, and at her death it is to go to her two sons. The relatives of Dixon tried to set this will aside, but without success, both the superior and supreme courts deciding in favor of Amanda. By this decision of the supreme court Amanda Dixon is made the richest negro in America, and probably the richest in the world.

A press representative called at her residence, 452 Telfair street, in order to learn how she lived, her plans for the future, &c. Her residence is quite a large, double brick house, three stories high, containing some twelve or fifteen rooms, shaded in front by three mammoth oaks, surrounded by a large yard, and, all in all, a most desirable residence. It is handsomely furnished, and has a neat appearance. She purchased this house about a year ago, and has been living there since in company with her mother, Julia, who is now quite an old woman, and her two sons, one of whom has recently married.

Amanda is an unassuming, intelligent mulatto, and does not seem at all "set up" by her singular good fortune. She would not be noticed on the streets from hundreds of other colored women by any display or show of dress. She states that as yet she has no idea what she will do or where she will live in future. She has been advised to come north.

#### THE REVOLUTION IN HAWAII

Some of Kalakana's Promises-Two United States Vessels Near Honolulu.

San Francisco, July 10 .- The next steamer from Honolulu will arrive on Wednesday of this week, and until then nothing further will be ascertained concerning the revolution in the kingdom of Hawaii. When the next steamer from Sydney arrives at Honolulu the extent of ex-Minister Gibson's preparations for putting down a revolt of the people prob-ably will be made manifest. Detach-ments of the Honolulu rifles have been assigned to the duty of watching every

steamer coming in. On the night of June 30 J. S. Walker, auditor-general, and F. S. Pratt, registrar of public accounts, were noticed to carry from the palace a basket filled with documents supposed to have some connection with the opium bribery case.

Among King Kalakaua's promises to the citizens' committee were: that the balls given in the palaces should be discontinued henceforward; that a reduction in the force of attaches about the palace should be made; that the harpies and hangers-on who have luxuriated for six years should be cleared out, and that he would dispense with his Honolulu dancers.

The party will proceed over the Pennsylvania railroad direct to Holland Patent, where the president will spend Tuesday with Miss Cleveland. The child was found under the car and could not be extricated for some time.

HUNTINGDON, Pa., July 11 .- All the notel keepers in this city were refused licenses in February last and lately they all signed an agreement to close their places until October, when the supreme court is expected to render a decision in reference to the appeals of the saloon men from the court of quarter sessions, which refused the licenses.
