IN THE practice of green manuring, it is found to do well in any condition or season, or of soil, if it were needing any fertilizing agent. This will in all cases prove good for it, and in most cases will do more good compared with the cost of applying the whole crop than only returning a part of it, and using that in a live and green state, is better than to have it dead and dry before using. For some very dry seasons, and for some crops, the turning under of a heavy growing crop in green manuring a field, will help the soil to retain moisture enough to carry its crops through such a season better than with any other conditions of manuring or tillage for such a year.







to impair the vigor of swine. The custom of using young sows grew out of the loss of young pigs by pressure from the heavy dams, but a large breeding sow should not be fat and heavy. A sow over 2 years old will give more milk than a younger one, and, as a rule, she will produce stronger pigs.

IT IS as necessary to feed the soil in order to reap crops as it is to feed the animals for milk or increase of careass. The object should be to convert the cheaper substances into something cut five or six Spanish onions in slices, for which there is a demand. Every pound of manure is sent to market in the form of grain, meat, milk or vegetables of some kind. The more liberally the soil is fed the greater its capacity to produce.

IN BUYING eggs for hatching it is a good plan to buy two or more settings at a time; they can be bought cheaper, the express is little more than on one setting. If all be set at the same time they can be given to a less number of hens than it took to hatch them, and in this way some of the hens can be kept to serve their second term; and, best of all, if you be successful, in the fall you will have a nice little flock all of the same strain and age.

THE deeper the preparation of the soil the deeper will the roots penetrate, thus advancing closer to moisture, as well as permitting of the growth of a large preportion of those rootlets that collect food. If the soil be shallow and the subsoil hard the roots will spread nearer the surface, thus rendering them not only more liable to being winter killed but also to damage from drought.
