Getting Around the Inter-State Law.

CHICAGO, July 17 .- Before the inter-state ommerce law went into effect the favorite practice of the railroads who desired to cut rates and discriminate in favor of large shippers was to grant rebates. This being prohibited by the new law, some of the western roads have now hit upon a plan by which they will discriminate in favor of certain shippers. Instead of granting rebates, these roads, it is said, are now paying ten per cent. of the regular rates to persons securing them business. While these roads pretend to pay such commission to freight solicitors only, yet it can easily be seen that the commissions can be paid to any member of a large firm on the pretence that such party is a freight solicitor.

He Crossed the Alps With Bonaparte.

CANAJOHARIB, July 16 .- George Michael Blumbart, of this village has just died. He was born in Wurtemburg, Germany, in 1790 and early became a soldier. was under Napoleon Bonaparte when that emperor crossed the Alps. At the age of 27 he came to America, 196 days being oc cupied in making the passage. He retained his faculties to the last.

Thirty-two Deaths from Yellow Fever. KEY WEST, Fla., July 15 .- There have been no new cases of fever since yesterday, but there have been two deaths. The record now stands: Total cases to date, 119; deaths, 32; sick now, 57; discharged cured, 30.

To Cross the Oceau in a Baltoon, Paris, July 16 .- The Paris Figaro says that Captain Jovis will in October attempt to make a balloon voyage across the Atlantic to New York. He will start from Saint-Nazaiao.

Gossip About the Sports.

Jack Burke, the pugilist, will sail for Australia from San Francisco, July 29. President Kirkpatrick, of the L. A. W. is opposed to road racing and says he thinks the L. A. W. will do all in its power

Little Johnnie Murphy, the clever feather weight, is blooming into a good sprinter. Recently he won a 100 yard dash with Loring, who, at one time, ran in ten and a half

The famous Irish setter dog Garryowen, grandshire of the noted Elcho, Jr., died recently, aged ten years and eight months. He was the greatest prize winner of his race ever exhibited.

Mr. August Belmont, Jr.'s fox terrier Lucifer, which was sent to the jubilee show of the English kennel club, took first and special for best in open class. Mr. Belmont's dogs have won a number of prizes at other shows in England. Mr. Fred Hoey's Valet also came in for first. One thousand seven hundred and fifty dogs were benched in the English jubilee show. There were 60 mastiffs, 120 St. Bernards, 80 Great Danes, 35 Irish wolf hounds, 21 deer hounds, 110 pointers, 160 setters, 80 retrievers, 100 spaniels, 25 poodles, 70 bulldogs; the rest were terriers and fancy dogs.

Jim Glynn, the Williamsburg heavy weight boxer, is preparing on the quiet for an eight round go. Jack Dempsey is trying to arrange it for him with Peter J. Nolan, of Cincinnati. The contest is to take place in the west, probably about the first of September. This will be Dempsey's debut as a manager of pugilists.

Jack McAuliffe, the light weight, started in training for his match with the English champion Jem Carney at Lake Hopatcong to-day. The place is fifty miles from Jersey City, on the Delaware, Lackawana and Western railroad, and has been picked out on account of the exclusion it will afford. Bob Drew will go with McAuliffe more as a companion than as a trainer.

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John Teemer sent the following letter to the office of the Turf, Field and Farm with check for \$250: "After the race at Pullman on Decoration day, Edward Hanlan, according to newspaper report, said that if I had been a contestant I would have been beaten twenty lengths. That was simply the taik of a disappointed man. If Hanlan is twenty lengths better than myself should be eager for a race with me, I send you \$250 to bind a challenge to Edward Hanlan for a race of three miles at single scalls for \$1,000 a side, to be rowed in August, before Hanlan goes to Australia. KILLED AT HIS POST.

An Accident to the President's Train-The

Engineer Killed. Utica, July 17 .-- An accident happened to the president's train last night while returning from Clayton to Alder Creek. The train was brought to a stop before the president's party became aware that there was an accident.

The engineer had his hand on the whistle to blow for Stiles Crossing, when the connecting bar to the forward driver on the right hand side of the engine broke, and the huge piece of steel revolved with terrible velocity, tearing out one side of the cab and ripping up the ties and the ground as the engine rushed along. A huge fracture was made in the boiler, and the steam escaped in volumes.

The president, when informed of the affair, said he thought there was something serious the matter when he saw the clouds of steam.

Reilly, the engineer, who had saved his fireman by forcing him on top of the cab, was found lying alongside his engine dead. After instructions were given to care for the dead engineer, the president's car was attached to the express train, which had come up by this time, and was taken to Alder Creek, where the president and Mrs. Cleveland and others of the party left the car. JAKE SHARP VERY ILL.

His Physician Pronounces His Condition Very Critical-Affected by the Heat. NEW YORK, July 18 .- The terrible heat of

Saturday and yesterday had a depressing effect upon Jacob Sharp, in Ludlow street jail. He tossed and turned all Saturday night and moaned aloud in anguish.

Mrs. Sharp and Warden Keating paid the old man every attention and before daylight

yesterday morning it was found necessary o send for his physician. Sharp arose at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and drank a little milk, but could eat no breakfast. Dr. Loomis called shortly before noon and remained about ten minntes. He told Warden Keating that Sharp was a very sick man and that his condition was extremely critical.

Sharp's daughter, Mrs. Selmes, her husband and son Frank arrived at the jail early in the morning and remained the entire day.

None of Sharp's counsel called upon him and no other visitors were admitted. Warden Keating was completely fagged out and compelled to go to bed during the afternoon to recuperate from his exertions.

Pool Seiling Not Legalized. SPRINGFIELD, July 18 .- The attorneygeneral has decided that the law passed by he late legislature in relation to pool sell ng and book making on fair grounds does not authorize or legalize pool selling. The provisions of the act, he says, are excluded from application to inclosures of fair or race track associations incorporated under he laws of the state, during the time of the association. He further states that if pool selling is permitted on a fair ground t will be considered a gambling device, and that such society in his opinion would not be entitled to the \$100 provided by law for agricultural societies.

They Will Urge Cleveland to Go West. St. Louis, July 18 .- Mayor Francis has appointed a committee to carry the invita-

tion to President Cleveland to visit St. Louis during the fall festivities. On this committee are the presidents of the various associations having charge of the fall ens representing the Union and Confederate soldiers and business men. The colored citizens are represented by one of their race. The delegation will start on next Saturday.

Burned to Death in His Drug Store. LINCOLN, Neb .- Frank Coy, of Daven-

port, was found burned to death in his drug store. About 1 o'clock in the morning he attempted to go down stairs with a lighted lamp when he fell headlong, breaking the lamp at the turn in the stairway. The oil flewall over him saturating his clothing and taking fire. Mr. Coy's clothing was hardly burned off. Everthing goes to show that he had been fighting the fire until he succumbed by suffocation.

Trying to Save the Trunk Murderer.

St. Louis, July 17 .- The father of Brooks alias Maxwell who killed C. Arthur Preller at the Southern hotel two years ago is now on his way to St. Louis. The execution is set for August 26, and it is thought that the old gentleman's presence here may secure the doomed man at least a stay of execution. His attorneys expect to take the case before the United States supreme court, thut desires first to consuit the father.

Death in the Gale. OLEAN, July 17 .- A large portion of a tannery being erected here was blown down

by a strong gale. Several workmen fell with the ruins. E. Reynolds was fatally injured. George Moore, John Goodsell, and James Murray were seriously, and several others slightly injured.

Convicted of Pension Frauds. WASHINGTON, July 18 .- The commis

sioner of pensions is informed of the conviction at Knoxville, Tenn., of Thomas G. Barry and John J. Ball, charged with making false certificates, and of the plea of guilty made by Samuel L. Sussong to the charge of forging an affidavit.
