FREAKS OF THE FIRE FIEND. A'Family Terrified by Articles In the

House Bursting Into Flames. WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 7 .- The people of this town are greatly excited over the strange and inexplicable scenes which for the past twenty-four hours have been enacted in a little two-story frame house on Victoria street, occupied by Reginald C. Hoyt, a picture-frame dealer. His in the case. family, consisting of his wife, five children Two of the and two neices, are in a state of great mental fear and anxiety, and will probably vacate the house to-night. Since 11 o'clock yesterday morning no less than forty fires have broken out in various parts of the house, and bedding, furniture. window-shades, clothing, and various household articles have been partially destroyed. Only untiring vigilance has prevented the house and its contents from burning to the ground, and this would have caused the destruction of other buildings in the vicinity.

These fires can be traced to no human agency and even the most sceptical are staggered. Without premonition and with no lamps lighted or stoves in use, various articles would burst into flames. Now it would be a curtain high up out of reach, then a bed quilt in another room would begin to smoke and smoulder, and, as if to still further nonpluss the theorists, a carpet covered lounge was found to be all afire underneath, among the jute stretched above the springs. A basket of clothes in the shed burst into flames and the basket itself was partially consumed. A child's dress hanging on a hook, a feather bed, a straw mattress were ignited and would have been consumed but for water poured on them. The villagers believe the house haunted.

IMITATING AMERICAN GOODS. How the Germans Deceive San Salvador-

ans and Injure American Trade. WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 .- Consul Deepre, at San Salvador, reports to the department of state, that "products of American soil, skill and industry are supplanted in Salvador, and I suppose everywhere in Central America, by base imitations. Iron machetes are substituted for those of steel as manufactured in Connecticut and New York. The trade marks of American artisans are stamped or imprinted on the worthless German implements. I am told that 50,000 machetes are sold annually in Salvador at an average price of \$3.50 each. American osnabergs, sheetings, muslins, and calicoes are driven out of Central American markets by goods bearing the brands and trade marks of the best American mills. These worthless German goods are made of East India and Egyptian cheap, short-staple cotton, and are utterly valueless.

Perhaps the poorest beverage ever imoibed was German claret sold here and bearing the trademark of the best wine grower of California. Beautiful bottles, bearing on their exteriors pretty labels of the great beer distilleries of St. Louis. Philadelphia and Milwaukee, are full of decoctions brewed in Germany. Perhaps the deadliest of all these beverages is the "Kentucky whisky," so labelled, but distilled in Germany. I have seen Colts and Remington repeaters sold here that were never in the United States. I was told that these were products of that forgotten "Birmingham" of England, but these illiterate natives demand the cheapest goods.

### A TOWNSHIP TERRORIZED. A Band of Roughs Plunder the Farm-

Houses and Abuse the People. EAST SAGINAW, Mich., Aug. 7 .- The people in the township of a Tymouth, this county, are in a state bordering on terror at the depredations of a number of tough young men. A gang of six entered Mrs. Shaw's house Friday night, and two men with revolvers covered the inmates who had not retired, while the others ransacked

When all the booty the place afforded had been secured the family was forced to prepare supper for the party, and all ate as if it was their first meal that day. They repaid this by compelling their hostess to drink up all the milk left in the pitcher. Other similar outrages are reported, and

worse ones. Yesterday a farmer named Murrell came to town with the report that the gang visited his farm and killed, dressed and carried away the larger part of a young beef and stole a horse.

## Disappointed Sight-Seers.

New Bedford, Aug. 8.—Yesterday fore-noon Mrs. Cleveland, Miss A. L. Davis, General Greely and Mrs. Greely attended service at, the Congregational church in Marion. Mrs. Cleveland was dressed in a dark dress with lace sleeves. The party walked the entire distance from Gen-eral Greeley's house to the church, over a mile. The services were conducted by the Rev. John Fulton, of Medway. In the afternoon Mrs. Cleveland took quite a drive with her uncle Harmon, and, as a consequence, did not reach home in time to attend service at the Episcopal chapel, as had been announced that she would do, and thereby a large congregation which had gathered was much disappointed. Many persons came in carriages from neighboring towns to see her, while others came from more remote points by rail.

His Riches Cannot Save Him.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 7 .- The statement is made here that J. C. Flood, president of the Nevada bank and partner of John W. Mackay, is dying. He has been confined to his bed for some days at his Menlo park residence, and is reported as getting worse from an abscess in his head. Mr. Flood was one of the original firm of Flood & O'Brien, who started a whisky business in San Francisco in the gold fever days. They gained an experience then which stood them in good stead when silver was found in the western states. With Hill, Fair and Mackay they bought the Comstock, or Bonanza mines, near Virginia City, Nev., which eventually placed them among the richest of the world's capital-

Once a Thief, Now a Parson. CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 4.—Rev. J. C. Kraemer, came here from St. Louis last week to become pastor of St. Peter's Evangelical German church. It has been charged that twenty years ago he served a term in a prison in Germany for embezzling from the government while a postal clerk. German clerical circles are divided on the subject, and the scandal promises a serious disturbance Mr. Kraemer does not deny the story, but says if twenty years of honorable living cannot atone for a fault, then christian charity is meaning less.

BALTIMORE, Avg. 8 .- Jake Kilrain, who is matched to fight Pete Nolan, of Cincinnati, telegraphed that he would be unable to keep the engagement, as he had recived a message from Richard K. Fox, his backer in the coming fight with Jem Smith, the English champion, requesting him to engage in no fistic encounter until the international meeting has taken place. TWO OF THE CREW PEACH.

They Tell What They Know of McGarigle-A Denial by the Captain. KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 8 .- After the schooner Blake had been drawn alongside the wharf, officers Holmes and Snodden, of this city and Napance, boarded the vessel again and made a proposition to the men to return to Chicago and give evidence

Two of the crew, Jonsson and Swanson, both Swedes, intimated their willingness to make terms and were conducted to the hotel, at which Deputy Sheriff Galpin and Sergeant Major Sanford, of the Chicago police, were stopping. The sailors agreed to return to Chicago and act as witnesses if they got sailors' wages to and from Chicago and while they were in Chicago, which agreement was then signed. Jonsson and Swanson afterward made depositions on oath. They said that on the evening of July 23 the schooner dropped down the river. Captaln Irwin went ashore, and when he returned aboard he was accompanied by a man who went direct to the cabin and was not seen until the next day on Lake Huron, when the schooners Blake and Marsh collided and when Captain Freer boarded the Blake to talk about damages. He identified Wil-

liams as McGarigle. Captain Irwin warned his crew to say nothing about the man who was on the Blake. The two men were shown a picture of McGarigle and said it resembled the passenger who was known to them under the name of Williams.

The captain would not make any deposition, and the detectives promise to make things not for him and Captain Freer of the Marsh if they ever go to Chicago

Captain Irwin says that he was glad to see that the men were being paid so well. They knew nothing about Williams, however, as to when he reached the uessel or when he left it. He had not bimself seen Williams since he left the vessel, and did not think that he and McGarigle were one and the same person. So far as he was himself concerned he did not fear arrest in Chicago, or trial, having done no wrong. Dr. St. John was also innocent.

Only Ten Years Old and a Parricide,
