THREE DROWNING ACCIDENTS. A Young Girl, Two Boys and a College Pro-

fessor Lose Their Lives. BURLINGTON. N. J., Aug. 22.-Little Maude Carter was drowned in the Delaware river, in front of her home and in the sight of her parents. The girl was nine years of age, and the daughter of Frank S. Carter, of the fir m of Patrick & Carter, the Philadelphia electricians. He resides in an elegant villa on the green bank above St. Mary's hall. Maude was playing in a boat near her father's steam yacht, the Laura Buck. She was suddenly taken with an epileptic fit and fell into the water. The father and mother were at the time standing on the lawn in front of the house, but before they could reach her she had drowned. The body was recovered.

LANCASTER, Pa., Aug. 21 .- Two young

lads were drowned at Levan's mill, on the Conestoga. Harry Fisher, aged fourteen, son of a farmer, attempted to swim across the creek to Emanual Zwalley, a friend of the same age, who was on the other side. He got intola sink hole and began to drown. Zwalley, who was a fine swimmer, went to his rescue and reached him after he had gone down twice, when Fisher threw his arms around his would-be rescuer's neck. Zwalley was thus unable to help himself and both boys sank together. The bodies were recovered after several hours search. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 22.-Dr. Nathaniel Archer Randolph, professor of hygiene in the University of Pennsylvania, and residing at No. 132 Price street, Germantown, was drowned at Longport at the lower end of this beach. Dr. Randolph and his wife were bathing in the surf, and getting beyond their depth became exhausted and called for help. Mr. Topliff Johnson, of Germantown, went to their rescue and succeeded in getting both ashore, but in an unconscious condition. Dr. Remington Frischmuth, who was present, made every effort to resuscitate Dr. Randolph, working at it for over three hours, but without avail. Mrs. Randolph was restored to consciousness. IMPROVED OUTLOOK FOR CROPS More Rain Has Bettered the Condition of

Things in General. WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.-During the week ending Aug. 20 it has been slightly warmer than usual throughout the southern states and the Ohio valley, and cooler than usual throughout the lake region and the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, the average daily temperature in the last named district ranging from 2 to 4 degrees below the normal. In New England, the middle Atlantic states and on the Pacific coast the temperature differed but slightly from

The large deficiency in the rainfall for the season, ranging from five to fifteen inches in the Mississippi valley, has been slightly reduced in the northern states and augmented in the southern states during the past week, the only sections reporting an excess of rainfall for the seasons being northern New England, central portions of the middle Atlantic states, southern Dakota and the north Pacific coast.

The weather for the week has been favorable throughout the corn belt, the recent rains having greatly improved the condition of that crop, but owing to the lateness of the rains in the principal corn producing states the yield will probably

be below the average. In the cotton region from Alabama westward to Texas the weather for the week has improved the crop conditions, and the cotton harvest is progressing, but more rain would benefit the crop in the central portions of Arkansas. In North and South Carolina an excess of rainfall for the week is reported as unfavorable for the cotton

THE OLDEST BANK PRESIDENT Col. Samuel Shoch, Who is in His 91st

Year, But Attends to Business Daily. COLUMBIA, Pa., Aug. 20 .- The retirement from active business of Daniel Spraker, for thirty-five years president of the Mohawk bank at Fonda, N. Y., on account of physical infirmity, he being 90 years of age, leaves Col. Samuel Shoch, president of the Columbia national bank, beyond doubt the oldest bank president in the country.

Col. Shoch was 90 years old on the 28th of last May, having been born in Harrisburg in 1797. In 1839 he was made cashler of the Columbia bank, and served as such until 1878, when he was elected president of the bank. He was a delegate to the re-

publican national convention of 1860. Col. Shoch attends to the routine duties of his office with unvarying regularity, beginning work at 8 o'clock in the morning, and remaining at the bank until the last account is arranged and the bank closed. He is in the best of physical and mental health, and does not look more than 60. His venerable contemporary, ex-President Spraker, has been blind and deaf several years. Col. Schoch has two diversions of which he is passionately fond. One is teaching a Bible class, which he has taught every Sunday for many years, and the other is playing the violin. He is an excellent performer on that instrument, and plays on a rare old Stradivarius.

Found His Afflanced in a Coffin.

Athens, Ga., Aug. 19 .- Jasper Porter. who lives near this place, was affianced to Miss Wards, who lived in the neighborhood of Walnut Church, in Jackson county. Their wedding day was set for the near future, and he had an engagement to visit her to arrange the final details. He started across the country on horseback and when nearing the church he saw a crowd there, and, finding that it was a funeral, he dismounted and entered. The preacher was in the middle of his discourse, and no mention was made of a name by which Mr. Porter could tell who the dead person was. When the sermon was over the coffin lid was opened, and all were invited to take a last look. Mr. Porter took his place in the procession, and was shocked upon reaching the coffin to find that it contained the dead body of his affianced. She had died suddenly, and the notice of her death was on its way to him by mail.

A Coffee Pot Would Hold the Baby.

Monnoe, Ga., Aug. 18.—Three miles from this place is a log house, the home of Dennis and Betsey Broughton. Seven weeks ago a child was born to them which weighed at birth scarcely two pounds. Today it will tip the beam at scarcely three pounds. The child's full name is Martha Ann Mary Magdalen Frances Cleveland Broughton. At first sight, the little one's features seem slightly drawn, but form and features are alike perfect. The head is the size of an ordinaay apple, the hand not as broad as a man's thumb, and a coffee pot would make a comodious abode for it. The mother says there is nothing the matter with it; "jes' small dat's all."

An Innocent Man Sentenced to Death. ATLANTA, Aug. 21 .- Forsix weeks Henry Pope, charged with assaulting Miss Minnie Kenrick in Chattooga county, has been confined in Fulton county jail. A telegram from Somerset, Ky., tells of the arrest of John Taylor there, who confesses that he committed the crime. The strange part of the story is that Henry Pope was convicted and sentenced to death, and was only saved by the interposition of the governor. Miss Kenrick swore positively that he was the man, and yet between him and Taylor there is not the slightest resemblance.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22 .- The affairs of the informer, Nic Schneider, the boodler were yesterday placed in the hands of a re-ceiver on the application of one of his creditors. An order was issued requiring M. C. McDonald and others to render an ac count of any dealings they may have had with Schneider. As contractor Schneider was merely a dummy for the boodlers.

The Ranks of Labor. The Mexican Central railroad company, whose engineers went on strike about a week ago, has secured all the engineers necessary to run all their trains and the

The Pennsylvania railroad employees have been granted a national charter by the general executive board of the knights of labor. The work of organizing a national trade district will be pushed forward as rapidly as possible. The oystermen's union has commissioned men throughout the United States to organize the oystermen in the different sections for the purpose of forming a national

A movement is on foot to organize an independent political party. Work in organizing the different districts will be begun immediately. The object of the party is to defeat Henry George, and as a prominent socialist of the tenth assembly district said this morning, "teach him a lesson."
