FARM NOTES.

AVERAGE MILK YIELD .- The average milk yield in something that does not seem to have been defined, and we find very vague ideas prevailing on the subject. The estimate, for practical purposes, might exclude Jerseys, whose milk yield, by compari-son with that of other breeds is no criterion of the butter yield, for which they are so especially remarkable. Nor should it include that of beef cattle, as do that estimates, as we understand them, of the Department of Agriculture. An understanding of the average milk yield, as existing among dairy herds, is the important thing to arrive at, and we should like to have some of our dairy-farmer readers give us particulars as to their own experience; and what the average yield is per cow, and what the general average of the herd is by the year; also, what the average value of the milk is per pound. These are questions that all dairymen should be able to answer regarding their own herds, as well as the cost of maintaining each animal. GREASING WAGONS. - The Coach Makers Magazine endorses the statement that few people are aware that they do wagons and carriages more injury by greasing too plentifully than in any other way. A well made wheel will endure constant wear from ten to twenty-five years, if care is taken to use the right kind and proper amount of grease; but if this matter is not properly attended to it will be used up in five or six years. Lard should never be used on a wagon, for it will penetrate the hub and work its way around the tenons of the spokes and spoil the for wooden axle-trees, and castor oil for iron.

Just enough grease should be applied to the spindle of the wagon to give it a slight coating; this is better than more; for the surplus put on will
