The Honey Bee is Found Guilty of Unlaw-

ful Trespass MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Oct. 9.-Suit was brought by John M. Olmstead, a farmer ef the town of Hobart, against Stephen W. Rich, one of the largest beeksepers of the country, and a prominent member of the National Beekeepers' Association. It appears that one of the many colonies of bees owned by the defendant and consisting of about fifty hives has been kept since June, 1886, on premises adjoining the plaintiff's farm and near his dwelling. Farmer Olmstead allegis in his complaint, that those bees are vicious and offensive insects, and that they have caused the members of his family great pain and annoyance by attacking and stinging them, and have like-wise harassed and injured his cattle. He asked the court to declare the bees trespassers and a nuisance, and to award him \$1,200 damages for the injuries already

The trial excited wide interest and was attended by many prominent apiarists from abroad, some of whom testified as experts. It is said that the defendant had the active support of the National Beekeepers' Association in resisting the plaintiff's claim.

On the plaintiff's part members of his household testified to the serious nature of the injuries inflicted by the pugnacious insects and in identification of the marauders as tenants of the defendant's hives. The defence relied mainly upon an alleged lack of proof of the identity of the marauders, as coming from the Rich hives rather than from the apiaries of other

neighboring beekeepers. The court ruled that the matter of identity was a question of fact to be passed upon by the jury in connection with the question of damages.

After a hearing that consumed the time of the court for two days, the case was brief consultation, returned a verdict for the plaintiff with six cents damages.

Washington, Oct. 9. - Assistant Secretary Maynard has informed the secretary of the wardens' association for the registration of criminals at Joliet, Ill., that fifeen sets of instruments which he has ordered from Paris for use in certain penitentiaries and other similar institutions, in the registration of crimis als under a new method of identification by "anthropometic measurements," invented by Bertillon of Paris, will be liable to duty on importation under existing laws, and cannot be admitted free.

Work on the War Vessels. WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. - Chief Naval Constructor Wilson went to Philadelphia for the purpose of visiting the Cramp shipyards and inspecting the work on the new naval vessels. He expresses himself as well satisfied with the progress made. Eleven hundred men are now at work, and 500 more will be employed when the material comes in faster than at present. 


