A GREAT GATHERING.

The International Military Encampment to Be Held in Chicago Will Be the Largest Affair of the Kind Ever Held in America-Troops from Abroad and All Over the Union Will Be Present-An Outline of the Programme,




AOMMENCING October 1 and continuing until October 20, 1887, there will be held at Chicago an international military encampment at the Central Driving Park Association and the West Side Driving Park immediately adjoining. This will be the first international gathering of sol

diery that has ever taken place. For over a dozen years past representatives of the various State militia in America have met in annual encampment in order to test the proficiency of the differ-ent regiments at drill and their skill at rifle

Among the first to recognize the importance and advantages of a citizen soldiery to our Government was General Charles S. Bentley, of Dubuque, Ia., of the First Brigade of Iowa Guards. He commanded the camps at Mobile in 1885 and at Wash-ington a few months since. He is now the manager of the International Encampment. Associated with him are General John L. Beveridge, ex-Governor of Illinois, Brevet Mayor General A. L. Chetlani, W. A. Giles, Philo J. Beveridge and Mayor T. C. De Leou. The object of this International event is to bring into closer relations the minds of the military powers of foreign Nations with those governing American troops, in order that there may be a free interchange of views and, from the experiences of all, such improvements in military tactics be adopted as will advance the proficiency of American soldiery.

In order to make the enterprise successful the railroads have contributed over \$28,000, and liberal subscriptions have been received from the hotel proprietors, merchants and others, until \$42,200 has been

secured, which will be offered as prizes as follows: For best battalion of infantry, judged by inspection and by drill, \$5,000; for best company of infantry, drill in the school of the soldier. manual of arms and school of the company, \$10,000; for best com-

The United States Government, recognizing the importance of this National en-campment, induced Mr. Bayard, Secretary of State, to give to the commissioners, Generals Bentley and Chetlani, credentials to enable these gentlemen to extend to foreign powers invitations to send as guests representative military organizations and officers. Centre Hall, Pa. The commissioners started on their mission abroad last May, and have but recently re-

turned. They succeeded in securing promises that troops would be here from Belgium, Sweden and Denmark. The Belgium contingent will be composed of ten officers and forty sub-officers, and soldiers of the guards, and will leave Antwerp September 19 for America. In England, Lord Wolseley, Adjutant General, manifested great in terest in the encampment, and said that he would like to revisit America, and sent the request for troops to be present to the Duke of Cambridge, Commander-in-Chief of the forces, who, it is understood, will permit representatives of the English troops to cross the waters.

Among other soldiers from abroad expected are a detachment from the London Scotish rifles, a company from the graduating class of the government military school of St. Cyr, France, a company with officers from the Netherlands, which will serve as an escort to Lieutenant-General Verspyck, aide-de-camp General of the King, and a company of rifles and officers from Switzerland. Colonel Commandant A. W. Greve and Major L. Sheltus Van Ysfeldyk, of the grenadiers, will accompany the troops from the Hague, and Lieutenant-General Baron Van der Gnussen, Colonel Bocquet and Lieutenant-Colonel Dusart, of Brussels, will appear with the Gardes Civiques.

From every part of the United States where there is a military organization will come representatives of that order. Among this number are the Third Infantry Wis consin National Guard, ten companies, commanded by Colonel Moore; Third Infantry
