General Grant's Favorite Daughter and Once the Pet of the White House-Her Return to America-Err Unhappy Wed-

[Special New York Correspondence.] The return of Nellie Grant Sartoris to this country will awaken pleasant memories among society people remember her as the per of the White House during her father's two terms. Of all the White House maidens none so completely charmed the hearts of Washington peo-

ple as Nellie Grant. girl to grace history. Jefferson's daughters were women grown when him. Harriet Lane, was a magnificently developed woman of twenty-nine when

MRS. SARTORIS. she became mistress MRS. SARTORIS. of the White House during the Administration of her uncle, President Buchanan. From the days of Buchanan on to Grant's time none but clderly ladies had presided over the social affairs of the White House, and, save for Tad Lincoln's, no child's voice had been heard within its walls.

Mrs. Sartoris was in her thirteenth year when she went to live in the historic old ouse. From the first she assisted her mothr in the lighter and more infortsal social uties until the time came for her debut. Her atural, winsome, sweet disposition made her the favorite of all who met her, Not particularly intellectual, by no means re-served or formal, she was an excellent type of the healthy, natural and graceful Ameri-

it was not long before she became the subject of attention from well-known young society men, and, being in the willowy age, when it might be possible for matters to go beyond the control of the General and his wife, she was sent abroad in her seventeenth summer. She was still a girl in manner and dress, and, indeed, had not yet put on long gowns. She went under the are of Secretary and Mrs. Berie, and was presented to Queen Victoria, who received her at Buckingham Palace as if she had been the daughter of a Queen. The young miss was as self-possessed as if she had been a Princess in truth. Duchesses and Marchionesses were received by her with all the grace and dignity of royalty itself.

It was on the homeward sail from this trip that Miss Nellie met young Sartoris. Secretary Borie and his wife were seasick and kept their state-rooms during much of the voyage. Miss Nellie, with her healthy physique and imperturbable digestion, went upon deck, and there she and the young Englishman, strolling up and down, became lovers, and all the mischief that the young lady was sent to Europe to escape was done at the eleventh hour of the journey. The selection was not one which approved itself to the Grants, nor did it, indeed, to people in general who knew much of young Sartoris. He had spent some time in Washington and his habits and characteristics were pretty well known. Being of a heavy,





indolent disposition, his chief amusement was billiards, gross jests, low stories and the society of tabooed persons. However, Nellie's heart was set upon him and her father consented. Sartoris was invited to dine at the White

House, and accompanying the President after dinner to the billiard-room for a smoke, made known his request, and it was granted. It was the first wedding in the White House for an age. Dr. Tiffany per-formed the service and Colonel Fred Grant was best man, the General giving away the bride. The subsequent career of the two young people is painfully well known. They have not lived together practically for several years. During the greater portion of that time Sartoris has exiled himself upon an island in Lake Michigan, near the Wisconsin shore. There, in a small log cabin, with his dogs and gun, and the rude comforts which he seems to enjoy, he has led a lazy, shiftless, unambitious life. His wife has spent her time with the Sartoris family in England, giving herself unsparingly to the comfort and well-being of her children. of whom she has four. She has been repeatedly urged to come to America and live with her mother, but she has regarded the good name of her husband and the future of her children as paramount to her own sorrows or comforts. There is little hope that Sartoris will mend his life, although what predisposition he has to it can not be under stood.
