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# THE DEAD STATESMAN.

PRESIDENT AND CAPINET TO AT-TEND MANNING'S FUNERAL.

The Treasury Building in Drapery-Mrs. Vilas' Dangerous Illness-The New Year's at the White House to be Very Quiet.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.-President Cleveland, Colonel Lamont and all the members of the Cabinet now here, leave to-night to sttend the funeral of the late Mr. Manning. They will probably go by a special train and will arrive in New York early on Tuesday morning and then take the train for Albany. Secretary Endicott, who is in Massachusetts, will join them, but Secretary Lamar, who is out of the city, may not be able to accompany the party. The members of the cabinet express their sorrow freely and earnestly regarding the loss which has accrued to the nation and to the Democratic party in Mr. Manning's death.

Workmen were at work all day yester-day draping the streasury department, in emory of the late ex-Secretary Manning. Mrs. Vilas, the wife of the postmustergeneral, is reported to be seriously ill with heart disease, and will probably be re-moved to her Wisconsin home as soon as practicable. Her condition was much aggravated by the recent fatal accident to fr.m the school. Judge Elliott, a relative.

The announcement of yesterday that the New Year's reception at the White House would be omitted on account of Mr. Manning's death has been recalled, and the reception will be held in as quiet a manner as possible

#### POISONED HER SCHOOLMATE. After a Quarrel One Young Girl Feeds Another With Arsenic.

FRANKLIN, Pa., Jan. 8 .- A few days ago he twelve-year-old daughter of Rev. Mr. Brove, of Plum township, this county, and the fiftcen-year-old daughter of William Stevens, had a childish quarrel at school. The next day the Grove girl spoke to her playmate and after talking a while she produced a paper containing a white powler and wanted the Stevens girl to eat some of it. The latter at first refused, but later, furing school hours, she was induced to eat some. Shortly afterward she was seized with violent convulsions and her screams created a panic in the schoolroe

She frothed at the mouth, rolled on the floor in agony and ran wildly about the room, her cries being frightful to hear. The teacher despatched a scholar after a doctor, who arrived in a few minutes. He at once pronounced the girl suffering from arsonical poisoning, her symptoms being shose of an overdose of the drug.

He relieved her with antidotes and sent her home out of danger. He said that if she had taken a triffe less of the posion it

would have been impossible to save her. She told how she had come to eat the poison, and the Grove girl said that she had procured t e arsenic at home, where her father kept it to kill rats, but that she did not know "it would hurt folks." Investigation proved that her story of getting the drug was true. She has been removed

#### Testing Dakota's Option Law.

ABERDEEN, Dak., Jan. 3 .-- The local option law, passed in so many of the counties of Dakota at the late election, is already being put to the test. The law gives county amissionors power to revoke a license granted by them, but makes no provision as to licenses already granted under city charters. Licenses in this city expire April 1, and the city council have refused to cancel them. The County Board of Brown County adjourned without action Saturday. The saloons will close, however, on or before April 1 unless the law be de cided unconstitutional. To test the question suit will be instituted here and in Fargo and Grand Forks and other points. 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
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#### The President's Gift to the Pope.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 -- President Cleveland's gift to the pope is a copy of the United States Constitution, beautifully engrossed and richly bound. It was for- several hours. warded to Rome through Cardinal Gibbons, who received it about three weeks ago. It was accompanied by a letter in which the president requested the cardinal to send his cordial congratulations to the pope on the approaching jubilee. The book is giltedged, containing fifteen pages, each eighteen inches square, and is bound with vellum of a cream color. The words "The Constitution of the United States of America" are on the center in gilt letters. The book rests in a handsome case of Tyrian purple. The few persons who have seen the present speak very highly of its merit as a specimen of what Americans can do in that line, but the greatest praise it has created has been that given the president for the simplicity of his gift.

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

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



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
