Great Rejoicing Over Obrien's Release

Serenaders Stopped by the Police. DUBLIN, Jan. 23.—An attempt was made Saturday night to serenade Mr. Wilfrid Blunt, who is confined in the prison at Gal way. The police interfered and ordered the musicians away. The latter thereupor embarked in boats and held a torchlight procession on the river beneath the walk of the prison. Seamen from the warship Banterer gave chase, but failed to capture the serenaders.

General excitement has been caused by Mr. William O'Brien's release from Tulla-more jail. Bonfires and beacon lights illuminated large districts in the south of Ireland Saturday night.

Kilrush was illuminated last evening and the streets were crowded with people. The Government proclamation prohibiting the meeting announced to be held there yesterday was publicly burned. All bonfires and blazing tar barrels were extinguished by the police. There was a conflict at Kilkee between the police and the people, and one policeman was severely injured.

Mr. O'Brien, who is almost prostrated with emotion, intends to attend the banquet given in his honor by his electors, and then to rest for a few weeks in accordance with his doctor's advice. In spite of the endeavors to prevent his whereabouts from becoming generally known, every mail brings him many congratulatory letters. He is residing with a friend in Dublin, and in an

DAN DRISCOLL HANGED. The Last Act in a Boisterous Career Closes

This Morning. New York, Jan. 23 .- Daniel Driscoll, the Whyo leader, was hanged in the Tombs yard this morning. He maintained his courage New York, Jan. 21.—Another trust has and passed through the trying ordeal with brave demeanor. The condemned man's last day on earth was full of affecting and ominous incidents. At noon yesterday the farewell lamentations of the agonized family rang through the corridors of the jail Driscoll's mother was the first to bid the unfortunate man good by. He kissed her fondly and pressed her hands between his

"God bless you, mother," he said. "Don't be sorry for me. Cheer up and don't give way. I'm all right, I hope. I'll pray for

The poor woman wept aloud on the shoulders of her son. Dan's brother Frank was terribly affected. His frame quivered with the effort he made to quell the outward manifestation of his grief, and his sobs were heart rending. For five minutes he clung about the neck of his doemed brother and kissed him as though he were his

sister. The wife's turn came next. She cried as though her heart would break with its agony, and he folded her in his arms and kisses away her tears. The little baby which has been so much talked about was taken up and fondled by the luckless father, and the sad scene came to an end.

Driscoll ate a hearty supper at 6 o'clock. The repast consisted of beefsteak with bread and butter. He smoked several cigars afterward, and sat in the corridor with his keepers, chatting familiarly and without constraint. His brother, with two friends, called on him, and the brother remained with him until 8 o'clock. The mother had applied for admission in the course of the afternoon and begged pite ously to be allowed to see her boy once more, but the keeper, under orders from Warden Walsh, would not let her in.

Fathers Gelinas and Prendergast called and prayed with the condemned man. He seemed devout and was grateful for their attentions. He went to bed at 12 o'clock.

This morning mass was said at 6 o'clock by Father Gelinas in the chapel of the Tombs. Breakfast was then served of which he ate sparingly. Shortly after breakfast the assistant of Joe Atkinson, the hangman, entered the cell, pinioned his arms, adjusted the fatal noose and lead him

to the gallows. The only persons present were Sheriff Grant, twenty deputies, Dr. Crosby, Chap-lain Loew, Father Gelinas, the hangman and his assistant and ten newspaper men.

KILLED IN THE RING.

Billy Dempsey Struck Down by "Swipes,"

the Newsboy. BROOKLYN, Jan. 23. -/ Tom White, better known as 'Swipes, the Newsboy," and Billy Dempsey, at one time employed by the New York Herald, met in the ring at Fort Hamilton Saturday night, and at the close of the first round Dempsey was struck in the jaw and fell to the ground senseless. He did not recover consciousness, and died within an hour. Dempsey was about twenty-one years old, and was married and had one child. The fight was arranged some weeks ago, had when the men met they were in prime condition. It was Swipes' fourth fight and the third he has won, though none of the others had such a fatal termination.

When the fight began both men advanced smiling and made a few passes at each other. Dempsey received a few light blows in the body and reeled. As he was falling Swipes landed a terrific blow on his jaw and the lad fell heavily to the ground. The spectators at first thought that the affair was a fizzle and began to comment

on the result, but some one remarked that it was a serious case. Dempsey did not recover consciousness and then they became alarmed. Restoratives were used, but they were found to be
