There is a perennial youthfulness about d Cape May which is continually tak-g shape in some new enterprise design-l to add additional attractiveness to the mous resort. In the days of old, when e fame of Cape May stood out boldly ainst all the world as the pleasure re ort of the American people, popular de-and was not so exacting. The wide-aching heach, the grand surf, good hoels, and fine company gave abundant leasure to the hosts of visitors who joureyed thither by boat or stage or cum-rous family coach. They demanded no eretricious features to heighten the atural loveliness of ocean or sky or to dd to the fascination of atmosphere. It as enough if they lived well and revel-d in the beauty that surrounded them.

Later on the world seemed to revolve Later on the world seemed to revolve ore rapidly, the visiting hos's were thirled over the Jersey sands in hours ustead of days. They found the same id Cape May which their fathers and randfathers had known, but the tastes of the children had changed. They lived nore in a day than their ancestors did in week. They longed for newness and reshness, and pined for excitement. heir no ions. Society held a summer ourt on the sands; glittering equipages olled along on the glistening beach; fes ivals of music and song mingled their narmony with neverceasing music of the waves; a great pier was projected out into the deep, where mirth and festivity chased away care. It was a new Cape May evolved from the substance of the

A striking fact in this connection is that everyone who visits Cape May always returns. It may be for a day only or two days, yet they go back. There is a singular charm in sea and air and sorf, which tempts the one-time visitor to renew acquaintance with the pleasureful surroundings.

The prospects for the coming season are bright. There is more activity in real estate than ever known before, and the demand for cortages and accommodarions foreshadow that not only are a large number of old admirers returning to their first love, but hosts of new suit ors are joining the procession.

Last summer, after hasty organization and rapid preparation, the grounds of the Cape May Athletic Club were opened. The success of the undertaking was conspicuous. Its organizers and patrons embraced all the prominent residents and property owners, and the spectators of the sports included everybody. This season the hand-ome grounds will be improved and a series of athletic exhibiion and sports of every character ex endng through the summer will be arrang-

The glittering gem of this year's acquired attractions is the race track. A very eligible piece of ground just outside the city limits on the turnpike leading to the Point has been purchased by the Cape May Driving Park Association. A mile and a half-mile track has been I id out and built, and work on the grand stand, club house, and stables are to be commenced at an early day and pushed forward to completion again the opening of the season. The grand stand will accommodate 5000 people and the stable is to furnish stalls for 75 to 100 horses. In the arrangement and construction of track and buildings some novel improvements will be added.

The old Cape May has long borne the palm for the beaty of its women, and it may now win new laurels from the physical strength of its mer and the records made on its turf.
