THE QUEEN OF THE COAST.

THE OLD FASCINATION AND THE NEW AT-  
TRACTIONS OFFERED BY CAPE MAY.

From Phila. Daily Times, April 14th, 1888.

There is a perennial youthfulness about  
Cape May which is continually taking  
shape in some new enterprise design-  
ing to add additional attractiveness to  
the famous resort. In the days of old, when  
the fame of Cape May stood out boldly  
against all the world as the pleasure re-  
sort of the American people, popular de-  
mand was not so exacting. The wide-  
sweeping beach, the grand surf, good  
halls, and fine company gave abundant  
leisure to the hosts of visitors who jour-  
neyed thither by boat or stage or cum-  
bersome family coach. They demanded no  
extraneous features to heighten the  
natural loveliness of ocean or sky or to  
add to the fascination of atmosphere. It  
was enough if they lived well and revel-  
led in the beauty that surrounded them.  
Later on the world seemed to revolve  
more rapidly, the visiting hosts were  
thirsted over the Jersey sands in hours  
instead of days. They found the same  
old Cape May which their fathers and  
grandfathers had known, but the tastes  
of the children had changed. They lived  
now in a day that their ancestors did in  
a week. They longed for newness and  
freshness, and pined for excitement.  
Great hotels were built to conform to  
their notions. Society held a summer  
court on the sands; gilded equipages  
rolled along on the glistening beach; fes-  
tivals of music and song mingled their  
harmony with the never-ceasing music of the  
waves; a great pier was projected out in-  
to the deep, where mirth and festivity  
chased away care. It was a new Cape  
May evolved from the substance of the  
old.

A striking fact in this connection is  
that everyone who visits Cape May al-  
ways returns. It may be for a day only  
or two days, yet they go back. There is  
a singular charm in sea and air and surf,  
which tempt the one-time visitor to re-  
new acquaintance with the pleasurable  
surroundings.

The prospects for the coming season  
are bright. There is more activity in  
real estate than ever known before, and  
the demand for cottages and accommo-  
dations foreshadow that not only are  
a large number of old admirers returning  
to their first love, but hosts of new suit-  
ors are joining the procession.

Last summer, after hasty organization  
and rapid preparation, the grounds of  
the Cape May Athletic Club were open-  
ed. The success of the undertaking was  
conspicuous. Its organizers and patrons  
embraced all the prominent residents  
and property owners, and the spectators  
of the sports included everybody. This  
season the hand-ome grounds will be im-  
proved and a series of athletic exhibi-  
tion and sports of every character en-  
ding through the summer will be arrang-  
ed.

The glittering gem of this year's ac-  
quired attractions is the race track. A very  
eligible piece of ground just outside the  
city limits on the tropic leading to the  
Point has been purchased by the Cape  
May Driving Park Association. A mile  
and a half-mile track has been laid out  
and built, and work on the grand stand,  
club house, and stables are to be com-  
menced at an early day and pushed  
forward to completion again the opening  
of the season. The grand stand will  
accommodate 5000 people and the stable is  
to furnish stalls for 75 to 100 horses.

In the arrangement and construction of  
track and buildings some novel improve-  
ments will be added.  
The old Cape May has long borne the  
palm for the beauty of its women, and  
it may now win new laurels from the phys-  
ical strength of its mer and the records  
made on its turf.

The next census of the population of  
the United States will be the centennial  
census. The first census was taken in  
1790, and at this period the whole popu-  
lation was less than four millions, or but  
little more than half of the present popu-  
lation of the Empire State of the Union.  
In 1810 it was about twice this number,  
and had more than doubled in 1840, and  
more than doubled again in 1870. In  
1880 it was more than fifty millions, and  
the next census will probably show a  
population of between sixty-five and  
seventy millions. In about thirty years  
thereafter it will, at the past rate of in-  
crease, be not far from one hundred and  
fourty millions. There are children now  
living who, if the past rate of increase  
shall be continued, will be living when  
the population of the United States will  
be nearly three hundred millions.

The latest lockout or labor trouble was  
the one that brewed in beer circles last  
week. Nobody is hurt—nobody cares  
beer or no beer, the world will move,  
and if it can't on beer, there are oceans  
of water to fall back on.  
The boycott of the beerdrinkers on  
beer is a temperance move in a new
