JOHN MORLEY.

A Rapidly Rising Liberal Leader—His Services as First Lieutenant to Gladstone. John Morley is rapidly rising to the proportions of a great leader on the Liberal horizon. As long as the Grand Old Man lives Mr. Morley will be a lieutenant, although his power and adroitness as a statesman oftentimes lead him into the position of supreme commander. He is a man of varied talents, who at twenty-one had capabilities in almost any direction in life. He was born at Blackburn in 1838, went to Cheltenham, and afterwards to Lincoln College, Oxford. Nowhere did he at any time display any great scholarship or prophesy his future greatness. When he left Oxford he plunged at once into London journalism. He had a brilliant, flexible style of writing, which he put to account first on the Literary Gazette. His work soon brought him to a promotion to a desk on the Saturday Review. That was in the time when the Saturday Review had a monopoly of thunder in the literary heavens and it did not take long for Mr. Morley to assume the proportions of a demigod in the eyes of English authors.

In time he succeeded George Lewes in the editorship of the Fortnightly, which, under his handling, became the oracle of the Liberal party in England. Mr. Morley read law with the famous Frederic Harri-

son, but has never practiced. Besides his career as a statesman, his achievements in literature would make him famous. He has edited much of the Englishmen of Letters series, and written books of world-wide fame on Voltaire, Diderot and Rousseau. When Mr. Frederick Greenwood retired from the editorship of the Pall Mall Gazette, Mr. Morley wrote his scathing and scathing opposition to Mr. Forster's administration of Ireland prevented the Liberal party on into its present position with regard to Irish independence. It was while editor of the Pall Mall Gazette that Mr. Morley wrote his life of Cobden. He ran for Parliament in the constituency where he was born, but was defeated. A year later in 1880 he was again beaten in Westminster; in 1883 Newcastle-on-Tyne elected him, and as the colleague of Joe Cowen, the famous Liberal editor, he has forged to the front in his party with a rapidity and strength never before seen in the history of English Liberalism. He is a pleasant, affable gentleman, and his constituents speak of him as "Jack," a circumstance which is as good as volumes of praise.

WHAT TRACHEOTOMY IS.

It is Not a Dangerous Operation as Performed on the Crown Prince.

The operation of tracheotomy recently performed upon the Crown Prince of Germany is not nearly so bad as it sounds. Experienced surgeons regard it as a very simple bit of surgery. They say that it very seldom proves fatal—never, in fact, if properly performed and if the patient is healthy. The whole matter is like this: When a patient's throat becomes so choked up that he can not breathe a small incision is made in the windpipe a little way below the Adam's apple. Into this opening a small silver tube is inserted. The tube is curved so as to reach down into the air passage in the throat. Outside the throat it projects a little, and tapes are tied around the neck holding it in position. The tube is apt to become choked up with mucus, so the usual course is to have two tubes, one fitting closely within the other, so that it can be removed at will and cleaned and then slid back again.

The cut here given illustrates very accurately the amount of space taken up by the tube. It shows that the operation is below, and so does not touch the vocal chords. But as the patient breathes in and out of the tube, and so no air passes the vocal chords, he can not talk. In order to articulate he must hold his finger over the orifice in the tube and do all his talking with the tube closed. To breathe, he must remove his finger, take air into his lungs through the tube, and then, reclose it in the orifice, he can go on with the conversation. One reason why tracheotomy is so generally believed to be exceedingly dangerous is because when performed on children, the results are nearly always fatal. It is most frequently done in cases of diphtheria as a last resort, and in spite of the relief this afforded the child often dies of the disease. The relief obtained by the insertion of the tube is instantaneous, and a person who is liable to death in a few moments breathes naturally and seems almost well. The risk to life is hardly appreciable.
