THE COST OF BEING SAVED.

A Chicago mathematician of an inquiring mind has just completed a curious table, the data of which is taken from the reports of the various missionary societies of that city, as to the actual cost in dollars and cents that is necessary to convert each individual heathen to Christianity, whether he be Chicago born or otherwise. He figures that to "gather in" an ordinary Illinois pagan is worth as high as \$394.23. For example, If you want to buya new to make a good Methodist of him costs \$25. To induce the same man to become a Baptist \$30 must be spent. Congregationalists come at \$45. To persuade him to be a Presbyterian is worth \$60; to be Episcopalian \$300, while before be joins the Lutheran or Catholic Church \$300 must be expended. Outside nations, of course, have different prices To make an African a Christian is worth \$14; an Italian, \$42; a Spaniard, \$55, and an East Indian, \$60. Japanese, Chinese and Jews cannot be brought to a proper way of thinking under \$80, \$100 and for the latter race \$2,800. From these estimates it would seem that conversion is an expensive material, after all, and perhaps Mahomet may have had some such figures in his mind when he adopted his famous plan of conversion with the sword. At any rate, it was a much cheaper proceeding, whatever may be said of its morality.

NEW MINERS' HOSPITALS.

In pursuance of the act of July 14, 1887 providing for the selection of sites and the erection of state hospitals thereon for injured persons, to be located within the bituminus and semi-bituminus coal regions of Pennsylvania, Governor Beaver to-day appointed the following commission: Fourth District, David Cameron, Wellsboro; Sixth District, H. D. Tate, Bedford; Third District, John J. Spearman, Sharon; Second and Fifth Districts, J. M. Ried, Dunbar; Eighth District, James P. Coburn, Aaronsburg; First and Seventh Districts, Henry Warner, Hoboken.

The law provides that these commissioners shall, within four months after the date of their appointment, select tracts of land of suitable area and character for the erection of the hospitals.

August Ziegle, a German aged 50 years, committed suicide by hanging near Lynnport, a station on the Berks and Lehigh railroad. His body was found dangling from the rafters of the barn by the wife of Daniel Schroer with whom he lived. A few days before he confessed to Mrs. Schroer of having mur. dered a man three or four years ago The murder was committed between New York and Philadelphia. Hesaid he watched a man going from work on pay day. Knocking him down with a club he cut his throat, then robbed him of \$50 and threw the body in the river, and then escaped. He explained a recent visit to New York by saying that the crime preyed so heavily on his mind that he was forced to go to the very spot where he killed the man, and it seemed to him that he could not leave the spot He, however, returned, but in a melancholy state of mind, and hoped to unburden his soul by confessing the crime. The confession brought him no relief, and he determined on suicide. Last August Ziegle inherited \$1,000, \$600 of which he invested in a small farm.
