The vote of the Methcdist Conference excluding women from acting as lay delegates seems to be a formal declaration by the brethren that they are fully satisfied with their experience of the feminine power of debate in domestic matters.

The young woman in Maine who traveled on foot eight miles and back to engage a minister to marry her to her fiance, will probably be a very energetic, useful wife. But there does not seem to be any very strong guarantee, in the premises, that the bridegroom will not let her split wood and do the chores while he held a barrel down, attending to political duties at the corner grocery.

At a gathering of K. of L. a few days ago, statistics showed the order to be on the decline. The report says that Districts have dissolved, locals have lapsed and individual members have withdrawn their support. At the Richmond session of the General Assembly, the reports showed 702,000 members. At Minneapolis the figures were 483,000. On the first day of the present month the books of the General Secretary show less than 240,000 members in the order, showing a loss of more than one-half of the membership since the last General Assembly.

Further, the depletion seems to have only begun, and the indications are that the grand organization, which numbered 702,000 sons and daughters of toil in 1886, will be reduced to less than onefifth of that number by the next session of the General Assembly.

The revenue at the present time is not sufficient to pay the large salaries of the general officers and to keep up the princely establishment they have provided for themselves in Philadelphia.
