

Emperor Frederick's Struggle For Life Ended.

DEATH CAME WITHOUT PAIN

He Was Conscious and Recognized His Friends to the Last.

Before He Died He Joined the Hands of Bismarck and Victoria as Though Anxious to Effect a Reconciliation-Surrounded by His Personal and Officia' Family at the Last Holding Hit Wife's Hand, With His Son and Sue cessor Standing at His Side-The Funeral to be Held on Monday-Short Sketel making a person afflicted with an incurable of King William II.

POTSDAM, June 16 .- Emperor Frederick & dead. His long struggle with death has ended, and all Germany mourns. His bed was surrounded by members of his persona' and official family from early yesterday morning until the end. He was apparently conscious most of the time, and suffered little pain. His death was quiet and peaceful.

The last bulletin issued by the doctors wa fixed to a tree so that it could be easily read. It was the original document, with the auto graphs of the doctors, instead of the usual copy. Shortly after it was posted there was a sudden commotion in the castle and court yard. Servants were hurrying in and out, with expressions of despair upon their faces. Crown Prince William had been walking in the emperor's courtyard, stopping from time to time to look towards the house.

The emperor's head was raised on large pillows; his wan hands rested on the cover let. Dr. Mackenzie stood between the bed and a table cover with instruments and medicines. The crown prince stood opposite him The empress was seated at the foot of the

bed, but later she knelt at the bedside, and remained in this position during the last hours watching her dying husband's fain gasps for breath.

During the night the emperor had beckoned her to his side. As she bent over him he mur mured a single word, then short sentences which she alone understood.

At the foot of the bed knelt the emperor' daughters, Prince Henry and the two daugh



In accordance with the wishes of the late emperor and of the empress, Emperor Wil-liam II has ordered that the funeral be held Monday morning. The obsequies will be de-

void of pomp, and will be of a military character. Owing to the limited accommodation the attendance will necessarily be very small. The family will attend a funeral service in the Jasper gallery at 6 p. m. on Sunday. Requiem services will be held in all the churches at 7:30 p.m. Sunday. It is

inderstood that a general period of mourning of six weeks will be proclaimed. All public amusements will be suspended until two days after the funeral.

Dispatches announcing regret are coming in from all parts of Europe. The emperor's death has a decided influence on the bourses. POTSDAM, June 18.—The funeral of Emperor Frederick III was held to-day. Rain fell in torrents. The ceremonies were very impressive.

The new king, Emperor William II, in sisted on an autopsy before burial. It was found that the disease which resulted in Frederick's death was cancer, which is acknowl-edged to be incurable. There is a German law disease ineligible to the German throne. It is said that Emperor William had the post mor-

tem held, hoping that it would prove that his father held the throne illegally, and that now, as things have turned out as he desired, he will declare some of the official acts of Frederick to be invalid. It is even said that his well known hatred of his mother will lead him to declare that she is not legally dowager empress, and deprive her of the title and incomes resulting from it.

THE NEW EMPEROR.

A Perfect Soldier and a Disciple of Bismarck.

Emperor William II was born on Jan. 27, 1859. He is the son of Victoria, the English

His wife is another Victoria, the Princess Auguste Victoria, daughter of Frederick, Duke of Schleswig-Holstein. They were married in his wife's 23d year at Berlin, on Feb. 27, 1881. She is not of royal blood nor of personal beauty, and their married life is said not to be ideal. Damaged by a Storm.

HONESDALE, Pa., June 18 .- A terrific hail storm has passed over Damasqus and Berlin townships, Wayne county. Berch Pond, a little hamlet in Berlin, suffered greatly. Windows of dwellings not protected by shutters were broken. Gardens and fields grain were destroyed and trees stripped of their foliage. Two barns were struck by lightning, one in Berlin, belonging to ex-Commissioner Williams, and one in Texas, owned by Nicholas Wizard. In the latter four little boys were playing, one of whom, aged 8 years, was killed and another stunned so that he remained unconscious several hours. Neither harn was burned.



Prince Frederick Charles, who had strewn the coverlet with white roses, stood with the rest of the family. At some distance were the members of the household.

The servants were crowded about the doors, with bowed heads and bated breath, and from time to time the litany was interrupted by half restrained sobs, the most heartrend ing being those of old Wendelin, who had been the emperor's trusted servant since his youth. He is quite prostrated, and it is not

likely that he will survive the emperor long. The crown prince, who was too distressed to remain long in one place, paced backward and forward between the palace rooms and the courtyard. Thus the end came.

During the last hour the empress held the emperor's right hand, and the crown prince and crown princess stood on the left side of the death bed. The laurel wreath now lying on the body was given to the deceased by his father after the battle of Woerth.

The empress, overwhelmed with grief, withdrew to her apartments and saw no one. It is now stated that the remains will be interred within the Friedenskirche, besides those of Frederick II. The will of the deceased, deposited in the archives of the minister of the household, will be duly opened in

the presence of the minister of justice The issue of the proclamation of William II to the nation is not expected until after the funeral. By order of the Evangelical

A touching scene occurred at the bedside some time before the emperor's death. Bismarck had called to bid his dying master . last farewell. The emperor was thoroughly conscious, and, taking the hand of the aged marck, thus giving a silent and pathetic token of his desire for a reconciliation of all differences between his wife and the prime minister.

After the death cast has been taken the castle will be surrounded by a thousand hussars and Uhlans. Nobody is allowed to enter or leave the castle where the remains lie excepting a few priviledged persons. All the soldiers have taken the oath of allegiance to the new ruler of the empire.

New York Times: "Imagine to yourself a young man in his

30th year, 6 feet in height, straight as an ash sapling, with finely formed, slender limbs, narrow hips, swelling chest and square, broad shoulders, with a smallish head on a long, full throated neck, held proudly upright, and an

oval face, with an aquiline effect of profile, clear cut, strong chin, bended nose, prominent though not high cheek bones, and good. open forehead-all as regular in ensemble as a Greek triumphal arch, with clear, sharp, cold, gray-blue eyes light brown hair, close cut behind, but longer on the crown, and rising from the temples to form a sort of ridge from the parting across the brow, and a yellowish mustache loosely curled up at the ends-and you have such a portrait as words can paint of the coming German emperor.

"On this fair picture there is one blot. By an accident at his birth his left arm was crippled, and is a nearly useless member. It hangs across his body as though in an invisible sling, and the misformed hand is always gloved in public. He also suffers from ancestral scrofula."

On Feb. 8, at a dinner in honor of the Brandenburg provincial diet, in proposing the toast of the province, William gave this clue to his policy as emperor:

"In my rides through Brandenburg in the course of the maneuvers, the flourishing fields and the trades which I found in full activity clearly showed me where the true foundations of national prosperity and fruitful labor were to be found. I am well aware that the public at large, especially abroad, imputes to me a thoughtless inclination for war and a craving for glory. God preserve me from such crim inal levity ! I repudiate such imputations with indignation. But still, gentlemen, I am a sol-dier, and all Brandenburgers are soldiers. This I know. Therefore let me conclude with the words which on Monday last our great chan-cellor addressed to the reichstag, which on that day showed us the grand spectacle of the popular representation going locked hand in hand with the government.
