
FARM NOTES.

PACKING BUTTER.-It detracts greatly from the market value of butter to mix different makes, which generally means different colors, together in a solid pack. Buyers of country made butter in large quantitles usually work it over again and color it uniformly before packing it down in a solid mass. This, however, injures the grain, and the result is to average the quality of the good and poor that are packed together. When practicable, it is best to keep each make by itself and ship it to market in rolls, wrapped in bleached butter by long keeping.

In packing solidly in tubs or firkins to a season of scarcity and better one of the best:

Pack only sweet and fresh rolls where the buttermilk has been got out and the grain of the butter is good. Wrap each roll in a thin muslin cloth wet in strong brine and back the rolls closely in the package without jamming or disfiguring them. Then immediately cover the butter entirely with clear, strong brine and set it away in a cool place. In this way each roll is entirely submerged and does not icome in contact with the air.






