
FARM NOTES.


PICK apples at the right time, assorting them as you pick, and put all the sound ones in bushel boxes. Take these boxes to some central and convenient place for packing in good clean barrels. Make a table say six or eight feet long and three feet wide at one end, and narrowed to eight or ten inches wide at the other. Place boards six inches wide around the top. Have the table high enough so that an apple barrel will just go under the narrow end. Make the other end of the table four inches higher, so that the apples will gently roll to the end toward the barrel. Empty the bushel boxes in this barrel, and you can see all the imperfect fruit, which can be readily picked out and the good fruit placed carefully in the barrel. In this way assorting can be done very rapidly. Proper assorting of fruit has been talked and written about for years, yet many fruit growers will not learn that the practice is money in their pockets. Certainly it does not pay to put a peck of small apples in a barrel of larger ones. They do not measure any more and only lower the price upon the whole product. If possible, select a good dealer in fruit and sell to him. If you can guarantee your fruit, you will have no trouble in selling. I make all my small sound apples into cider, using a power press with a capacity of eighty barrels per day. Adding three pounds of grages to each bushel of apples improves the quality of the cider. 





THE GRANGE APPLE .- This new apple was first brought into public notice by the Mullica Hill Grange, of Gloucester County, N. J. At the meeting of the American Pomological Society, held in Boston last September, it was favorably noticed by the Native Fruit Committee. In general appearance and size the fruit resembles the Rhode Island Greening, being large, nearly, round, and slightly flattened at the ends; when fally ripe its color is greenish yellow, with a few red dots, and a blush on the sunny side. Its flesh is fine grained and of a mild, subacid flavor, season from December to March. The trees make a strong. vigorous growth and, with proper care, bear abundant crops annually.

The curious fact that usual h at produced by friction is absent when the articles are magnetized is just now being discussed by scientists who are seeking an explanation. Very striking examples are described in a late number of a scientific periodical. A workman fastened a couple of powerful magnets to his lathe to hold more securely a piece of metal which he wished to drill and turn. The presence of the magnets kept the metal so cool that no water was needed to keep the drill moist and cool. This unusual circumstance may lead to important mechanical advantages.

In generating steam, experiments under various boilers show 1000 feet of gas to be equal in heating power to from 80 to 133 pounds of different kinds of coal. One pound of coal equals in value 71 feet of natural gas. The latter explodes violently when mixed with 9 to 14 parts of air. When burned with pure oxygen, the flame temperature of the natural gas is estimated at 7100 degrees centigrade. When burned with just enough air to secure perfect combustion, the tem-peratures are estimated at 2333 degrees centigrade for natural gas, and 1700 degrees for Siemens.

The arc lamp in the St. Catharine's Light-house, on the Isle of Wight, is said to be the most powerful electric light in the world, and equal to 60,000 candles. The carbon pencils have a diameter of 21 inches, and the electric arc bridges a space of about 1 inch be-tween the carbon joints. The lamp is of the Serrin-Berjot type, and the dynamos by De Meritens, of Paris, while the engines to drive them are of the compound type, by Robey & Co., of Lincoln.
