## THE KEYSTONE STATE.

NEWS TOPICS OF LOCAL INTEREST TO PENNSYLVANIANS.

Vacts and Fancies Greaned from Many Sources and Rolled Down to Brief Paragraphs for the Benefit of Busy

Kutztown, Pa., Oct. 6.-A terrible accident occurred yesterday afternoon on the Kutztown fair grounds. The Roman chariot races had just commenced, and two chariots, each drawn by four horses hitched abreast, had made one circuit of the race course, when one of the teams became unmanageable and dashed into the crowd of spectators. Men, women and children were trampled under feet and a number of persons were injured. Following were the most seriously injured:

David Swan, aged 70, fatally; Miss Annie Fegeley, critically; Walter Treichler, severe, internally; Miss Mary Barto, severe, internally; - Ettinger, hips and spine; W. B. Bast, a telegrapher, severely. A number of children, whose names could not be learned owing to the excitement, were run over and sustained bruises and contusions. The races were brought to a sudden end, and the chariots and horses were sent at once from the grounds, owing to the bitter feeling against the drivers.

Congressional Nominations. PITTSBURG, Oct. 3.-The Democratic conferees of the Twenty-first district nominated Dr. H. L. Donnelly, of Latrobe, Pa., for congress. The Rev. William A. Rankin, of Oil City, was nominated by the Democrats of the Twenty-seventh district.

Worried to Death. HARRISBURG, Oct. 3.—Charles A. Breitinger, youngest son of the late William Breitinger, a once prominent hotel keeper of this city, committed suicide by taking morphine at his Front street residence. Worriment over a law suit was the cause of the act.

Justice Agnew's Wife Dead. BEAVER, Pa., Oct. 3 .- Mrs. Agnew, wife of ex-Chief Justice Agnew, died after a lingering illness. Her death was the result of a tumor, the location of which and her extreme age rendered an operation impossible.

Fatal Crash in the Lehigh Valley. Easton, Pa., Oct. 4 .- A freight train on the Lehigh Valley railroad got on the main track near Packerton just as the down express for New York and Philadelphia was due. A collision resulted, wrecking the engines of both trains, smashing three freight cars and damaging the platforms of the cars on the express train. Fireman Thomas Force, of the passenger train, was fatally hurt. None of the passengers received serious injuries. The damage to the company will be about \$10,000.

The Secretary and Ex-Secretary at War. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 4 .- Charles H. Litchman, formerly the general secretary of the Knights of Labor, has began a replevin suit in the common pleas against John W. Hayes, the present secretary. The suit is for the recovery of two boxes of private papers which Mr. Litchman left at the general headquarters of the Knights of Labor. General Secretary Hayes recovered possession of the papers by entering security at the sheriff's office. He claims that the papers belong to

Probable Murder. LANCASTER, Pa., Oct. 6.-The body of Mary Dellinger, aged about 22, was found on the bank of the Little Conestoga creek, near this city. It is believed she was murdered. The woman's clothes were disheveled and the buttons torn from them. The supposition is that her assailant, after drowning her, pulled the body from the stream. The ceroner is investigating the matter.

Judge Thurman's Passing. PITTSBURG, Oct. 6 .- Judge Allen G. Thur man passed through this city last night on his way to Washington. To a Times reporter he said that the Democrats would carry New York and Indiana in November.

Bradenburgh Found Guilty. LANCASTER, Oct. 5 .- The jury in the case of Thomas F. Bradenburgh, the drug clerk who caused the death of John Wunder, of Columbia, by selling him morphine in mistake for quinine, returned a verdict this morning of guilty of involuntary manslaughter, with a recommendation to mercy. A motion was made for a new trial.

Two Boys Accidentally Killed. BEDFORD, Oct. 5 .- A gun in the hands of a Pennsylvania railroad brakeman named Robb, at Hyndman, this county, was accidentally discharged today, instantly killing two boys, sons of Henry Miller and A. B. Gross. The boys were aged 14 and 15 years respectively.

A Daring Robbery on a Train. READING, Oct. 5 .- A daring robbery was perpetrated on a passenger train of the Philadelphia and Reading road last night. The train had just left Kutztown, when four men seized Daniel Geist, a wealthy farmer, who was seated in a car in which there were a number of other passengers, bound him with a rope, rifled his pockets, then jumped from the train and escaped. Geist was too much frightened to raise an alarm, and the work of the thieves was over so quickly that the pes-sengers were not aware of the crime until the men had escaped. The thieves evidently expected to find a large amount of money on Geist, but they secured only \$18.

Confessed to a Fatal Assault. HAZLETON, Oct. 5 .- At the corner of Wyoming and Mine streets late last night Owen Leslie, of Jeddo, was found in a dying condi-He was taken to police headquarters, where he died in a few minutes. Chief of Police Gavitt ascertained that the dead man had been assaulted, and this morning arrested Owen Boyle and Patrick McLoughlin, of Ebervale, on suspicion of being implicated in the affair. At a preliminary hearing before Squire Schutter, Conrad Nelk and Henry Smink, Jr., confessed to having met Leslie and his son last night on the street, and after some inquiries by Leslie and the son, both of whom were intoxicated, they endeavored to assault them, and in self de fense Nelk pushed Leslie aside and he fell over the curb and water way, and in falling struck his head and broke his neck. Squire Schutter at once released Boyle and Mc-Loughlin and held Nelk and Smink.

Thrown from a Wagon and Killed. COLUMBIA, Oct. 5.—Rudolph Kauffman and his wife, living near Highville, were on their way home from Columbia market. As they were passing over the bridge on the road from Washington borough to the farm of Frederick Frey the axle broke and the wagon upset. Mrs. Kauffman was thrown out, striking on her head. The wagon fell upon her. She was rendered unconscious and was taken home, where she died last night without

## TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Many People Injured at a Corner Stone Laying.

DEATH BY A FALLING FLOOR.

Thrown Into a Struggling Mass-Abrupt Conclusion of the Ceremonies in the New St. Patrick's Polish Catholic Church at Reading.

READING, Pa., Oct. 6.—The corner stone of the Polish Catholic church, Twelfth and Spruce streets, this city, was laid yesterday afternoon. During the ceremony the floor, on which 2,000 men, women and children were standing, gave way, precipitating several hundred persons to the basement, a distance of 15 feet. Over 100 men and women were thrown in a heap, and were more or less injured, some seriously and others fatally

The wildest excitement followed, and the 5,000 spectators became panic stricken. Cooler heads, however, went to the rescue, and the unfortunate and the injured were taken into neighboring dwellings and physicians hastily summoned. Later the wounded were removed to their homes and to the various hospitals by ambulances.

READING, Pa., Oct. 9.—Yesterday only fully developed the extent of the terrible accident at the corner stone laying of St. Mary's Catholic church, when a girder broke and nearly 300 persons were precipitated inte the basement. The names and residences of the persons injured are coming to light every hour, and up to last night 148 persons had been discovered who have received injuries. This is not the entire number by any means as additional ones are continually coming te light. There is no doubt that the list wil reach 175.

A careful summary shows that twenty three persons had their legs broken, fourteen had arms broken, seven were injured in the spine, five had their ribs broken, three their hips fractured, five their ankles broken, and ten were internally injured, and the remainder, received cuts, bruises and sprains. Up to last evening there had been no deaths, though five persons are in a critical condition. Fathers Borneman, Garvey, Murphy and Libicki were out all day and night visiting the afflicted. Archbishop Ryan started for his home in Philadelphia overwhelmed with grief over the sad occurrence.

An investigation was made as to the cause of the accident, and experts say that it is due to bad timber. The girders ran the entire length of the building. These were mortised entirely through, and here the joists were inserted. This mortising rendered the girders, which were only of pine, very weak, and with a large crowd on top they simply snapped in twain. Mortising of girders is never allowed where the floors of a building are intended to be especially strong. Some time ago the city council refused to elect a city inspector. The proposition will be again revived, and there is no doubt that it will pass unanimously.

To Settle the Vexed Question. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.-In the United States circuit court Judge Hoffman set Friday as the time for hearing arguments in the cases of Chinamen who hold certificates of alleged residence in the United States as to their right to land from incoming vessels on a writ of habeas corpus. The question will be opened by motion on the part of the attorney for the Chinese for writs for their clients, which are held by the custom house authorities. This motion will be opposed by the United States attorney, and the opinion of the bench will decide the validity of certificate rights of "prior residents" and other minor points in connection with the operation of the new law.

Frederick's Biography. LONDON, Oct. 9 .- A biography of the late Emperor Frederick will shortly be published in London. The volume will treat solely of the dead kaiser's domestic life, and is be lieved to have been written by his widow. this theory being supported by abundant evidences of her handiwork in the context. The preface states that profits accruing from the sale of the book will be devoted to the establishment of a hospital for the treatment of diseases of the throat.
