

FARM NOTES.

THE Holstein cow"Shadeland Boon." from June 6 to July 6 (31 days) produced 125 pounds and 12 ounces of unsalted butter, or over four pounds per day. This is the most remarkable record known. It required about 14 pounds of milk (about seven quarts) to each pound of butter. During seven days of the time she produced a fraction less than 32 pounds of butter, and zave 400 pounds of milk. For two days she lacked only two ounces of prolucing five pounds of butter per day, which was made from 14.18 pounds of milk for each pound of butter.

ASHES should never be left exposed to the rains. They should be kept under cover or scattered at once over the land. The potash in ashes is very soluble, and is easily dissolved out. By carefully preserving the ashes they may potatoes, or on fields deficient in ilkaline substance. They should never be added to the manure heap.

PASTURES should be grazed down, and no tall grass or weeds should renain. Not only is it injurious to allow the weeds and grass to remain, but stock will be inconvenienced in wet leasons unless the frosts come early. Dry pasture should be preferred in ainy weather. Tall grass is very inurious to sheep, getting them wet and :ausing distemper.


