POPPY ANEMONES.

Most hardy bulbs and tuberous-rooted plants must be planted in the autumn, as will be advised then, for ensuring satisfactory displays of flowers in spring, but a few may be planted now, including the above very beautiful flowers. The ground should be dug deeply, adding manure if it is poor, and if it is inclined to be light or sandy, it is an excellent plan to tread it some what firmly before planting. This, however, must only be done when the surface is dry. Possibly it may be little, simple and elaborate. Several kinds of these which have been hitherto resting will now be starting into growth. Especially may this be the case with Fuchsias, Geraniums, and others that are stored in dark places. Plants are perfectly safe in the ark so long as they are leafless and the buds on the stems remain dormant, but when these push growths half an inch ong, it is imperative that the plants be brought to the light, as if they remain long in darkness after new growth comences they will be seriously injuredndeed, ruined.

The shoots made in the absence of ight are white and tender, and it is not advisable to expose them to the sun at nce. A partially light position for three or four days is the most suitable, so that the shoots gradually assume a green hue, and then they should be placed in the lightest position at command. Strong artificial heat is not necessary for them, and often proves injurious. So long as they are out of the reach of frost they will be safe, though when a person has the temperature under control, as in a well-heated greenhouse, it may range about 45deg. from fire heat, increasing with sun to any extent at this early period of the

Continue to exercise great care in watering, examining the plants every morning, and giving a supply to those, and those alone, that would be likely to get too dry before the next morning if no water were given them. By following that rule, and it cannot be difficult to comprehend, the plants will be kept in good condition so far as it depends on judicious applications of water, and undoubtedly this is the most important factor in the successful cultivation of

plants in pots. Bulbs that are flowering, or approaching that stage, must have water on the first faint signs of dryness of the soil, for if water is withheld until the earth in the pots is quite dry injury will be done. 
