AN HISTORIC DITCH.

The Old Pennsylvania Canal to Be Abandoned.

A LONG CAREER OF USEFULNESS.

For Twenty Years It Was the Great Highway of the State—Its Glory Gradually Fades—The Old Ditch Will Be Filled Up to Form the Pennsylvania Railroad Roadbed.

HUNTINGDON, Pa., Sept. 23.—The old Pennsylvania canal, which for years was the channel of commerce and travel from one end of this state to the other, is about to be permanently abandoned.

From 1830, the year in which the canal was first put in operation, until 1850, when the Pennsylvania railroad completed its line from Philadelphia to Pittsburg, the canal was the only means of transportation for passengers and freight across the country.

From 1850 until now the canal was still maintained throughout a portion of its route for carrying coal, stone and lumber.

From this town westward to Petersburg the canal was totally destroyed by the overwhelming floods of last June, and the channel is now a ruinous mass of debris and rocks, in many places levelled up even with the banks on either side.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 21.—There was a jollification at the boarding house kept by Mrs. James Farrell, at Mayville, near this city, and the sudden death of the proprietress during the festivities caused rumors to gain circulation that she had been murdered.

HUNTINGDON, Pa., Sept. 23.—Rev. E. F. Fleming, the colored minister who was recently taken to South Carolina to be tried for a murder alleged to have been committed by him some years ago, has been assigned by the African Methodist Episcopal conference to the pastoral charge composed of Huntingdon and Lewisport.

MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., Sept. 21.—Hugh Roberts and Anthony Marchetti, miners employed at the Alaska colliery, were instantly killed by a fall of rock. They were crushed out of shape.

NEWS BRIEVITIES.

Gen. E. Burd Grubb, of Burlington county, received the Republican nomination for governor of New Jersey.

Many Grand Army men favor Mrs. Logan for commissioner of pensions.

Michael Gaughan, aged 25, was killed at the Lackawanna Coal and Iron company's steam mill in Scranton by a lump of coal falling from a height and striking him on the head.

Tony Hart, the well known comedian, is again in the Massachusetts State Insane asylum, and his condition is now deemed hopeless.

A dispatch from Danville says: A cold wave struck this section and the weather is cold enough for fires and overcoats. No damage to crops is reported.

Governor Hill addressed 10,000 people at the interstate fair at Elmira, N. Y.

Women will vote in Wyoming, when it becomes a state.

Eighty men left the shops of the Duncan Leather company, Woburn, Mass., striking for a restoration of the prices paid previous to the recent reduction.

Snow whitened the hills at Gulf Summit, Fulton county, N. Y., seven miles east of Susquehanna, Pa.

Private Dalzell calls upon the soldiers to raise a Tanager fund.

On the trial of the cruiser Yorktown at Newport a speed of 16.98 knots was got and a horse power in excess of that developed at the contractors' trials.

The prosecutor of the pleas of Camden county has secured what he believes is conclusive proof that Annie Leakey was murdered by her uncle, Chauley Leakey.

The convention of the Cigarmakers' International union decided that strikes should not be declared as a last resort.

Bismarck is endeavoring to give the czar's visit political significance, which the latter is trying to avoid.

The Berlin merchants have entered a formal complaint against Consul Edwards, but it is receiving little or no attention.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 21.—The reunion of the Army of the Cumberland closed with a grand barbecue at Craw Fish springs, on the edge of the famous battlefield of Chickamauga.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23.—The market was firm. Pennsylvania advanced 1/4 but closed unchanged.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 23.—The coroner's jury, after investigating the cause of the death of Mrs. Adams, of Casey, Ill., one of the victims of the electric railroad disaster, returned a verdict charging negligence on the part of the company in not providing adequate machinery to prevent such accidents.

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FRENCH ELECTIONS.

A Substantial Republican Victory Indicated.

THE REPUBLIC BREATHES FREE.

Comments of the Press of Paris and Berlin—Many Rebellots Necessary—A Republican Majority of 168 in the New Chamber—Boulangier Counted Out.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—Returns from 500 divisions show the election of 224 Republican and 159 opposition members. In 177 divisions supplementary ballots will be necessary.

The results of the elections produced a favorable impression on the Bourse.

BERLIN, Sept. 24.—The National Zeitung regards the result of the French elections as favorable to the republic.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—The general belief in Paris is that Gen. Boulanger was elected in the Montmartre district and Counted Out.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—M. Jules Ferry was defeated by a close vote. His brother Albert was elected in an adjacent district.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—The cause of the death of Wilkie Collins was paralysis of the heart accelerated by acute bronchitis.

PARIS, Sept. 24.—At a meeting of local assembly of the Central Labor union the question of prohibiting Canadian labor in this city came up and was discussed at some length.

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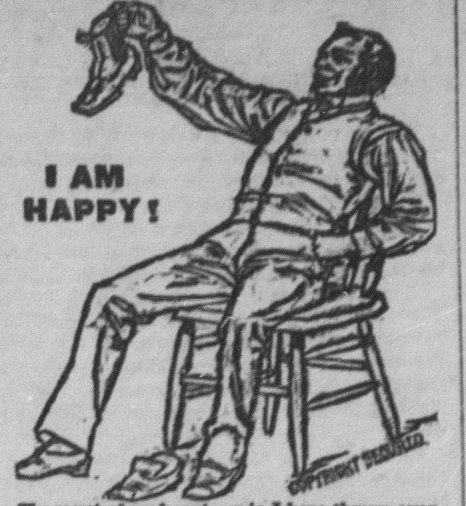
