A PARASITE!

HOW SHERIFF COOK ROBS THE PEOPLE BY ILLEGAL FEES!

Systematic Robbery as Practiced upon People in District by the Present Sheriff.

From the Centre Democrat.

Two years ago, without any apparent cause, the people of the county defeated the candidates of the Democratic party and elected a Republican Sheriff, Treasurer, Recorder, two Commissioners and Associate Judge. At that time the business and financial affairs of the county were well conducted and in most excellent condition. A debt of \$38,000 had been paid, all the old and outstanding tax duplicates and claims in favor of the county, had been collected, where it was possible to do so, long standing claims against the county settled on the most advantageous terms it was possible to obtain, the public buildings were repaired and greatly improved, the public grounds beautified, and many necessary first class iron bridges built and taxation reduced from five to two and a half mills. Nothing existed, it is clear, in the management of the affairs of the county to cause the defeat of our candidates, or change the administration of the business of the county. Even at this day, and in view of the inefficient and miserable manner in which every department in the hands of the Republicans (except the recorder's office) has been managed, it is impossible to conceive any cause for the defeat then, other than that our candidates were fiercely assailed and traduced, abused, vilified and lied about by those who desire to plunder the taxpayers of the county by, through, and with connivance of the Republican officials.

After two years experience, have the people of the county not had enough of Republican rule to be abundantly satisfied that it is unsafe as well as unprofitable to further trust that party with power, or place any more offices of the county in their possession. When the Republicans took charge of the commissioners office, the county was never in a better financial condition. The debt entirely paid and an available balance in the Treasury of \$38,000, in less than two years this large balance is gone and there is existing to-day a county debt of over \$8,000. The annual statement prepared under the direction of the majority of the present board, certified by them as correct, shows that in one year the ordinary expenses of the county have been \$8,136.69 more than under the Democratic administration.

Those who have had business to transact with the present board of commissioners know the great difficulties under which it is accomplished. With the majority of the board in a continual wrangle, their inability to agree on anything at any time, their snarling, impudent, and disagreeable treatment of the people, their disposition to postpone business and throw the responsibility from one to the other, their want of good judgment and ordinary common sense, their absolute lack of knowledge of the duties of the office, and ability to comprehend and understand the business they have to do in their official capacity, make it exceeding disagreeable to have any business transactions with the commissioner's office.

The people justly complain of the manner in which they have cared for the public property. When the public buildings and grounds came into their hands they were in most excellent condition. The court house yard, always a beautiful spot when properly cared for, is turned into a play ground and filled with ash piles. The grounds on the hill, on which thousands of dollars had been spent to beautify has been turned into a cow pasture.

In a desperate effort to make the people believe that they are conducting the business of the county so as not to increase taxation, assessors are cursed because they had the courage to honestly regard their oaths in making the valuation of property. Assessments are over thrown, treated as of no use and the Commissioners arbitrarily, without any reference as to whether it is just and right or legal, increase the valuation of real estate, so that the revenue is increased without raising the millage in laying the taxes for 1889.

This ought to be enough to satisfy the taxpayers of the county that a great mistake was made two years ago when a portion of the offices of the county was placed in the hands of the Republican party. But this is not by any means all.

Just now the Sheriff of the county and his deputy are engaged in traveling the county, and using all their official power in the interests of the Republican candidate for Prothonotary. There is reason for this, nine-tenths of the business the Sheriff has, comes through the Prothonotary's office. The present sheriff is greatly given to taxing illegal and enormous bills of cost, and it frequently

happens that the Prothonotary, now in office, has to revise these bills and cut them down to within the limits of the law. To this the Sheriff objects and wants a Prothonotary who agrees with him in politics, and who will aid him in plundering the people. In order to show that what has just been said is absolutely true we refer to some cases, wherein the Sheriff has taxed a large amount of cost to which he is not and never will be entitled.

In Fi. Fa. No. 57, Aug. T. 1889, against George Wohlfart, debt, interest, etc., \$530. Poundage taxed by the Sheriff, \$10.66.

Fi. Fa. No. 53, Aug. T. 1889, against Grenoble Store Co., debt, \$263.39. Poundage taxed by the Sheriff, \$5.26.

Fi. Fa. No. 1, Aug. T. 1889, against W. D. Snyder, debt and int., \$714. Poundage taxed by the Sheriff, \$12.80.

Fi. Fa. No. 44, Nov. T. 1889, against J. C. Dale & Co., debt \$512.50. Poundage added by the Sheriff, \$10.20.

In all of the above cases the writs show that they were returned unexecuted by "order of the plaintiff's attorneys." In the last case No. 44, Nov. T. 1889, the costs were paid into the Prothonotary's office by the attorney for the plaintiff and the Prothonotary has refused to credit them to the Sheriff, because the \$10.20, poundage is illegal. Under the fee bill of 1868 by which the Sheriff's fees are regulated the "Commissions of the Sheriff are his compensation for recovering and paying money to the plaintiff, or his attorney, recovered upon any process, decree or order of Court." Wadlinger, in his Law of Costs, page 236-7, paragraph 97, says: "When upon execution issued, defendant pays the money directly to the plaintiff, so that none passes through the Sheriff's hands, the latter is not entitled to poundage, nor is he entitled to it, where execution is stayed, for if poundage could be collected in such cases the plaintiff might have to pay it several times on the same debt."

In some of the executions cited the money was paid to the attorneys, in some the writs simply stayed to give the defendants more time, but in all of them the Sheriff has added poundage. But this is not by any means all of the cost illegally taxed and unlawfully filched from people who are so unfortunate as to fall into the hands of the Sheriff. To prove this we note the following cases.

Fi. Fa. No. 8, Aug. T. 1889, against George Bittner, et al., debt \$313.55, and Fi. Fa. No. 9, Aug. T. 1889, against Samuel Bittner, debt and int., \$148.20. In the first of these writs the return shows that the Sheriff made \$20.09. Yet he charged \$6.76 poundage and retained it out of the amount of money received by him, and on the second writ he made \$16.59 and charged \$2.95 cts. poundage and retained it out of the amount received by him.

In each of these cases the Sheriff charged poundage on the whole debt while he received, in each case, a very small portion of the debt. The same authority already cited, further says: "It (poundage) will only be allowed on the amount actually received, and not on the amount of the debt on the writ." Judge Mehard, of Mercer county, in the case of Miller and others vs. Griffith, 2nd, Vol. County Court Reports, page 531, holds that for receiving and paying money to the plaintiff or his attorney the Sheriff is entitled only to poundage on the amount received and not on the amount of the debt on the writ.

These authorities clearly show how open and bold has been the violation of law by the present Sheriff. But the peculations of the Sheriff and the robbery of the poor by him does not by any means stop here.

It frequently happens that the Sheriff has in his hands, at the same time two or more writs for the same plaintiff, against the same defendants. On these under the law the Sheriff is entitled to mileage on but one writ. Judge Krebs in the case of the Cresson, Coalport, Clearfield & N. Y. Short Route R. R. Co. vs. Bell's Gap R. R. Co., 3rd vol. C. C. Repts. page 645, long ago decided that under the fee bill of April 2, 1868, when the Sheriff has several writs on papers at the same time in his hands, in favor of the same plaintiff, against the same defendant, he is entitled to mileage on but one writ. In Fi. Fa. No. 39 and 40, Jan. T. 1889 against C. F. Beckwith, and Fi. Fa. No. 17 and 18 April T. 1889, against C. W. Korman the Sheriff of Centre county had more than one writ in favor of the same plaintiff and against the same defendant in which he charged and retained out of the money that came into his hands, full mileage on both writs in direct violation of the law.

We have only cited a few cases, for the want of space, wherein the Sheriff has been guilty of taking illegal fees. We do not want it to be understood that we have cited all of such cases, for to do so would cover almost every writ that came into the Sheriff's hands and the entire period that he has been in office. Just to Aug. T. 1889 we could have cited Fi. Fa. Nos. 50-1-9 and 82, to April T. 1889 Fi. Fa. No. 89, and Fi. Fa. Nos. 22-3 Aug. T. 1888 as coming under one or the other of the heads we have specified, wherein the Sheriff has taken more fees than he was entitled to under the law. But to him, a sworn officer of the law, it seems to be a delight to violate his oath, rob the poor and distressed, and if need be, cap the climax by insulting and indecently as-

saulting innocent and defenceless women.

We have now shown that the Sheriff charges poundage in all cases where the writs are returned unexecuted, and should a second writ be issued on the same judgment, he again adds poundage and retains the same out of the money that comes into his hands; that he charges poundage on writs where the money is paid to the plaintiff or his attorneys and exacts payment, the same as if the money passed through his hands; that he charges and has received poundage for the whole amount of the debt on the writ, while he actually made only a small portion of the debt; that he charges mileage on all the writs which come into his hands wherein the same party is plaintiff against the same defendant. But this is not by any means all the pilfering, embezzling, and illegal filching of costs from the poor and unfortunate that must be distressed by the Sheriff. In many cases the Sheriff has added \$2.75 costs for bills of sale when none were ever put up or even written. In other cases he purposely neglects to levy upon or advertise some of the property of the defendant, until after he has concluded one sale, then he will under the same writ, levy upon this property, advertise and sell it, thus enabling him to charge mileage twice on the same writ and for two sets of sale bills. The ways of the present Sheriff for the plundering of the people are many, dark and exceedingly sly.

How often the Democratic candidate for Prothonotary has stood in his way and prevented him from taking cost wrongfully from those in distress, will never be known. But enough is known to clearly show the motive the Sheriff has in devoting all his time and using all the power of his office to defeat our candidate for Prothonotary. It is apparent that the Sheriff wants a man in the Prothonotary's office who agrees with him in politics, and who at least will be in sympathy with him while filching from the people enormous, unjust and illegal bills of cost.

This, Democrats, is a brief statement of the manner in which the two most important offices (the Sheriff's and Commissioners') now in the hands of the Republican party, have been conducted. Have you not enough of Republican administration in Centre county in the way these offices have been conducted? Are you not satisfied that when our ticket was defeated two years ago it was a great mistake? In view of what has been done are you not more than satisfied that it would be an egregious blunder to permit any more of the county offices to fall into the hands of the Republican party. No officers in the county, not even the Sheriff and the Commissioners, do people come in contact with so much as the Prothonotary. The office is so important to everybody that the more experienced the incumbent, the better it is for the people.

The candidates of the party who have been renominated and are before you for re-election have proved themselves faithful, honest and competent, their experience fits them for the better discharge of their duties. They are the superiors, in every way, of the Republican candidates. Our candidate for Associate Judge who has never heretofore been a candidate will honorably and worthily fill the office for which he has been nominated.

The party is united and all we need, to wipe the stain of Republican rule from the fair face of our county, will be a full vote. What you gain in having the affairs of the county in the hands of honest and competent men will pay you more than ten fold for all the time, and energy spent in the effort to poll your full vote.

PEN ARGYL, Pa., Oct. 29.—The Pennsylvania, Poughkeepsie and Boston railroad was opened for travel from Campbell Hall, N. Y., to Pen Argyl. The first train through was a passenger and the next a freight, and these will for the present make one trip per day between those points. With good weather during the next three weeks the three miles of unfinished track east of Slatington and the bridge across the Lehigh at that point will be finished in time for trains to run through from Campbell Hall and connect with the Lehigh Valley railroad at Slatington before Dec. 1.

A Burglar Fatally Shot.

LANCASTER, Pa., Oct. 29.—Joseph Hoffman, a burglar, attempted to break into the house of William H. Kohns, in Mount Joy, and was shot by Kohns, the ball entering the left lung and inflicting, it is thought, a fatal injury. Hoffman is at the Lancaster hospital supposed to be dying. He is a native of Georgia, and has been in this country seven years. Lately he lived in Montgomery county, Pennsylvania.
