NEWS BREVITIES.

Influenza is epidemic in the New Jersey state prison. Governor Beaver will call the election to fill the late Congressman Kelley's place on Feb. 18.

Mrs. James Watson Webb, widow of the distinguished editor, died in New York.

Viscountess Kingsland is dead at the age of 86. She was quite poor, and twelve years ago was making shirts at sixteen cents a pair for a living.

Col. Mallison has been ordered to pay \$1,000 for libelling Mr. Herbert Gladstone in the Allahabad Post.

The Union hotel, at Prescott, Wis., was burned. The guests were nearly suffocated by smoke before they were all rescued.

The British ship Hampshire sailed from Bangor, Me., for Greenock Sept. 24 and has not since been heard of.

The libel suit of the earl of Euston against Mr. Parke, editor of The North London Press, ended in the conviction of Mr. Parke. He was sentenced to a year's imprisonment.

The Democracy of Philadelphia expects to make a big turnout at the Trenton inauguration ceremonies on the 21st instant.

It is now announced that the reported suicide of Alexander Harrison, the American artist, in England was erroneous.

Mr. Christopher Rice Mansel Talbot, for sixty years a member of the English house of commons, is dead.

A Brooklyn jury has awarded \$5,000 to Dora Klein in her suit for \$10,000 against William M. Peak for breach of promise.

The Central New England and Western railroad announces a through train service from Hartford to Philadelphia via the Foughkeepsie bridge.

In Mexico the editor of the newspaper El Progreso has been sent to jail for defaming Adelina Patti.

An universal exhibition will be held at Liege in June, on the occasion of King Leopold's jubilee.

Shad had been taken in the Chesapeake six weeks ahead of time. Congress did not meet till 1 p. m. in order to enable members to attend the funeral of Walker Blake.

The bodies of John Knoch, James McAdams, and Patrick Naylor were taken from the caisson where they were entombed a week ago.

Wild hogs entered the cabin of a farmer in the Chickasaw nation, near Arbuckle, and devoured a five-year-old child which was alone in the house.

Dr. Talmage is ill with influenza in London. Miss Bisland, the American girl who left New York sixty-six days ago in an attempt to girdle the globe via San Francisco and Yokohama in seventy-five days for The Cosmopolitan Magazine, sailed from Queenstown for New York on the Bohemia.

The Russian government has decided to abolish the autonomy of Finland. Le Dix Neuvie Steele, of Paris, states that the emperor of Austria will soon abdicate his throne.

An American lady, said to be a relative of Mr. Edison, while on the journey from Vienna to Berlin, was taken ill at the station at Dresden, Saxony. It was found she had the smallpox and she was sent to the hospital.

Steamers arriving at New York report terrific gales and heavy snow storms at sea. The duke of Aosta, who was king of Spain from Dec. 4, 1870 until Feb. 11, 1873, died at Turin.

The Samoan treaty negotiated last summer at Berlin, has been sent to the senate. It will soon be taken up for consideration in the committee on foreign affairs.

Archbishop Corrigan sailed from New York on La Bourgoigne to visit the pope, and hundreds of priests and laymen went down to the pier to bid him farewell.

Professor Solomon Sulzer, the chief chanter in the Jewish synagogue in Wien, is dead at the age of 85. He was known throughout the Jewish world as the finest singing composer to be found in the Jewish service.

Minneapolis ministers united in an attack on the Sunday press. The Brussels anti-alavery conference has been postponed until Thursday on account of the illness of some of the delegates.

Harry Pearce, a brakeman on the Louisville, St. Louis and Texas railroad, was thrown under the wheels at Gaston, Ky., and killed.

In Newburg, N. Y., a laborer went to the assistance of a horse which had been felled by an electric shock. He was killed by a sagging wire, was instantly killed.
