Consumers of cheese need not be told that its excelleuce depends almost wholly or the quality of the milk from which it is prepared, as is futher well indicated by the commercial terms of cream cheese, skim cheese, etc., according as the milk from which it was made may have been whole milk or skimmed and robbed of its cream. If the milk be poor in butter, the cheese must be equally so, and will grade according to its richness or defici-ency in cream. 

Nowadays thousands of farmers are discussing the problems connected with the feeding of their crops and stock in terms which were to them witnout meaning, an unknown tongue, less than ten years ago.

THE pony is the horse of hardships, says a horseman in an exchange, and one that has sprung from some poor country where he has ever been the child of neglect, he and all the predecessors of his race. In a rich country like the horse regions of Kentucky, for instance, his pony characteristics would invariably run out in the course of a few generations. He is not a distinct strain, as many would seem to suppose. He doubt less sprang originally from as good a strain of horses as the world knew of at the time, and his present reduced size and characteristic toughness have resulted unquestionably, from local circumstances.

ANSWERING the question: "Shall we plant the Russian apricot?" asked at the meeting of the Ohio State Horticultural Society, G. T. Trowbridge said that the apricots we now have would thrive where the peach would grow. The tree was as hardy or hardier than the peach, but the trouble was its early blooming; blossoming two weeks earlier than the peach, the crops were nearly always destroyed by the late frosts. If it should be shown that the Russian varieties blossomed as late or later than peaches, then we could plant them with of apricots.

PROFESSOR Sanborn, of Missouri, in more than 100 feeding tests, determined that to make a certain amount of gain, pigs weighing 220 pounds required 18 per cent. more food; pigs weighing 270 pounds required 50 per cent. more food, and pigs weighing 325 pounds required 78 per cent. more food than pigs weighing 70 pounds.

BRUSSEL STEAK -- Take half a dozen good sized onions, cut them into thin rings and soak one hour in salted water, drain them and fry quickly in hot fat; broil a good beefsteak carefully and pour the onions over it; put on plenty of butter, dredge with pepper and serve at once.

In frying chicken or turkey in a batter make a frying batter, using an egg to a pint of milk; cut the meat from a cold fowl in good sized pieces; dip them in the batter and fry to a good brown, seasoning with pepper and salt while in the pan.

Soak dry lima beans in lukewarm water over night. Put in a saucepan, cover with boiling salt water, cook until tender, drain over the water, season with cream, butter, salt and pep-

Put a quart of canned corn in a saucepan; boll in its own liquid fifteen minutes. Add half a teacup of cream and a teaspoonful of butter. Season

with pepper and salt.
