TWO PROMINENT MEN OF CENTRE AND UNION END THEIR LIVES.

Despondency and Sickness the Causes of Their Rash Doings.

Two suicides have started this section recently, one was that of Geo. W. Weiland at State College, the other merchant J. C. Raudenbush, at Laurelton.

J. C. Raudenbush, of Laurelton was a well known merchant and business man of Union county and of some wealth. He was prostrated by a fever some two weeks ago, and on Sunday evening last ended his existence by fastening a gun in a vice, and standing in front of it, he pulled the trigger and sent a ball into his brain.
