### Road Taxes And How Paid

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has recently rendered several decisions of general interest in the matters of road tax. The right of farmers to work out "Are all those pretty low-prictheir road tax has been generally if not universally conceded; supervisors in a few townships insisted that the tax must be paid in money. A test case has been decided in favor of the tax payers and their right to wor out the tax distinctly and finally affirmed. In other cases collecters of road tax have claimed a commission on the part worked out, as well as that paid into the county treasury. The Supreme Court has decided that all claims ,or such commission should be rejected, the work. ing of tax imposing on labor on the collector or treasurer, but on the super visor, who is paid for his services.
