Court.

Court met on Monday. Frank McCoy was appointed foreman of the grand jury. On Tuesday all witnesses in civil cases were dismissed, as the week was likely to be occupied by commonwealth business.

Commonwealth vs. John Burket violation of the liquor law, was the next case called. Found guilty and the Court sentenced prisoner to a fine of \$500, costs of prosecution and to be confined in the county jail for a period of three months.

Commonwealth vs. John McKinney Two counts—assault and battery and carrying concealed weapons. The case was brought at the instance of Prof. Richey, superintendent of the Phillipsburg schools.

Commonwealth vs. the Supervisors of Boggs township. The case is an action brought against said supervisors for neglect to keep the public highway, known as the public road from Snow Shoe to Snow Shoe intersection on the boundary of Snow Shoe township.

The Commonwealth vs. D. J. Meyer, assault and battery, was settled, and the case dismissed.

The grand jury ignored the bill against W. B. Mingle in the Shires note case.

The trial of Fietta Weaver for the murder of Andrew Weaver will be commenced this morning in court, and will likely consume the balance of the week.
