

UNFORTUNATE FARGO

The City Laid in Ruins by a Cyclone.

EIGHT KILLED IN A CELLAR

Where They Had Sought Refuge from the Storm—Wholesale Destruction—Churches and Business Buildings Demolished—A Train Blown from the Track—The Storm Elsewhere.

DETROIT, Minn., July 8.—A reporter of The Record describes the tornado which struck the city of Fargo, N. D., at 3:30 o'clock yesterday morning as follows: About midnight a strong wind prevailed, but no attention was paid to it until about 2 o'clock, when in a few minutes the citizens realized that a terrible tornado had visited down upon the city by the Red river and left a mark that will be remembered in years to come.

The storm demolished the Manitoba and Milwaukee freight houses, threw down the electric light towers, destroyed the fronts of the Davis block, the Opera House block, the Continental block, the Garfield block and the Wilchester block, unroofed the Northern Pacific freight house, the Republican office and the Chopin hardware store.

Wholesale Destruction.

The court house tower is badly twisted and deposited on the sidewalk on Tenth street. The Plymouth Congregational church is destroyed, the Luger Furniture company's warehouse is damaged. Numerous bricks from the The Argus brick block lie on the ground. The Deering warehouse is damaged to some extent, as also Alfstad's hardware store and Vachen's restaurant, and the rear building on the Bank of North Dakota lies on the ground in ruins. The Keeney block and Exchange hotel suffered badly. Dozens of smaller buildings and roads of sidewalks are demolished.

Killed in the Cellar.

The saddest of all is the death of the entire family, consisting of the mother and seven children, of the late Capt. McCarthy, which occurred at their residence at the corner of Ninth and Fifth streets. The family had taken refuge in the cellar, and in some manner were caught in the timbers of the falling building and crushed to death.

Train No. 1, the Northern Pacific passenger, was caught just as it was departing from Fargo, and was toppled over into a ditch. No one was killed, although many were injured.

The train consisted of three baggage cars and nine coaches, also Superintendent McCabe's special car containing a party of Chicago and Northwest officials accompanying Mr. McCabe. The passengers in the sleepers succeeded in dressing and saving their valuables, although it was difficult in the dark.

An Extensive Storm.

The storm extended over northern Minnesota and was slightly felt at Detroit, where it demolished the plate glass front of The Record office and overturned a few small buildings and one house was struck by lightning and burned. No one was hurt in this city.

The Storm in Moorhead.

Great Damage to Property but No Loss of Life.

MOORHEAD, Minn., July 8.—The storm which broke over this city at 2:15 a. m. was never equalled in this part of Minnesota. Fully \$25,000 damage to property was done in this city, besides a number of people being injured. So far as reported there is no loss of life in this city.

The most serious damage to property was the blowing down of the foundry, also the round house belonging to the Great Northern railroad. A part of the roof and several chimneys were blown from the state normal school also from the high school. Considerable damage was done the Grand Pacific, Jay Cooke and Central hotels.

A large number of buildings in the country near town were blown down and considerable damage done to grain. The grain elevator at Liberty, situated near here, is blown down and lies across the Northern Pacific railroad track.

In the Lake Superior District.

ASHLAND, Wis., July 8.—A violent wind storm, amounting to a cyclone, and accompanied by an extraordinary electrical display, passed over the Lake Superior district. At Houghton outbuildings, trees, fences, etc., were demolished. At Lake Linden lightning struck the residence of Jennie Vanagran, destroying the house and seriously injuring two members of the family.

Objected to Ex-President Hayes.

NEW YORK, July 5.—At the annual meeting of the New York State Society of the Cincinnati, held yesterday at Delmonico's, Hamilton Fish was re-elected president, Gen. John Cosgrane was elected vice president, in place of Alexander Hamilton, deceased. Gen. Cosgrane moved that ex-President Hayes be made an honorary member by suspension of the rules. There was some opposition to the motion, and it was decided, inasmuch as Mr. Hayes is an honorary member of the Pennsylvania State society, to withdraw the motion. A banquet followed the meeting.

Married in a Balloon.

LOWELL, Mass., July 5.—Charles G. Stowell and Miss Lottie E. Anderson were married yesterday up in a balloon, 10,000 people at the fair grounds witnessing the event. Rev. W. W. Downs, of Boston, performed the ceremony. The balloon, which was in charge of Professor J. K. Allen, sailed away to the north after rising, and up to a late hour its landing had not been reported.

Election Frauds Punished.

JERSEY CITY, July 8.—The Hudson county election officers, convicted last week of fraud and conspiracy at the late election in Jersey City, were sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment each. Their names are Thomas Hart, Thomas Fallon, Jacob Moschel and Thomas De Raney.

Beverly Tucker Dead.

RICHMOND, Va., July 5.—Col. Beverly Tucker, aged 72 years, a prominent man in the history of Virginia, died here yesterday. During the war he visited England and Canada in the interest of the confederacy.

SOULES' GREAT SWIM

How a Foolhardy Michigan Man Sought Notoriety

BY BREASTING NIAGARA'S RAPIDS

He Spends Five Minutes in the Water, Passes through the Most Dangerous Part of the Rapids, and Crawls Ashore Exhausted and Bruised—Will Try It Again.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., July 5.—Soules, the swimmer, at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon dipped his feet and arms in the water and waving good-bye to the people on the bridge slid off into the rapids.

At the point where Soules received the signal "go" the water is very swift, but forms a series of eddies, and instead of going out toward the center has a tendency to bring objects to the shore. It could be seen that Soules was making strenuous efforts to get out in the middle of the river without making much headway and was still going down the river.

Dashed Against a Rock.

As he passed under the railroad suspension bridge he was treading water, with his body well out. Just below the bridge he struck some large boulders and was out of sight for an instant. As he came in sight he was within a few feet of a large rock, against which he was dashed, badly bruising and cutting his left knee and left foot.

But he passed over all right and could be seen swimming a good stroke. His effort to keep away from the rocks had used up a good deal of strength, and finding he could not get out into the river, he swam to shore and was helped out on the rocks, having been in the water about five minutes.

More Pluck Than Strength.

He expressed a willingness to start out again, but it was evident that he had had all he wanted for one day at least, and it required but little persuasion to induce him to give it up. Although his trip was short it was a dangerous one, Soules being the second swimmer to successfully swim that part of the rapids.

Capt. Webb went through with only swimming trunks and lost his life. Kenyon, the most powerful of the three, went through with a life preserver, but was taken out exhausted.

A Fortunate Escape.

From Soules' condition when taken out the chances are had he gone the full distance he would have been taken out by the whirlpool a corpse.

Soules came here from North Muskegon, Mich., where he claims to have been employed as an engineer. He claims to have been interested in several swimming matches in the Detroit river.

PORTLAND, Me., July 5.—The city of Portland gave a celebration yesterday in honor of the Army of the Potomac. There was a grand military and civic parade, the most powerful in the city since the naval vessels in the harbor, and a firemen's parade, to which various other cities contributed.

BEARDSTOWN, Ill., July 5.—At the Fourth celebration here yesterday S. F. Black, a young man residing at Quincy, Ill., attempted to make a balloon ascension and parachute leap. When the balloon was at great height the canvas of the parachute was seen to be in flames, and after the man was dashed to the ground, he was horribly bruised.

Saluted Corporal Tanner.

AUBURN, N. Y., April 5.—Thomas Ditton, a harness maker, had both hands blown off and was otherwise injured last evening by a premature explosion of a cannon. It is believed the man will die. He and three comrades were firing a salute in honor of Corporal Tanner.

Five Years for Archer.

BALTIMORE, July 8.—Ex-State Treasurer Archer came into court, pleaded guilty to a charge of embezzlement of the funds of the state, and was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. This sudden and unexpected ending of the case caused considerable commotion in all circles.

Mr. Blaine at Bar Harbor.

BAR HARBOR, Me., July 5.—The Kebo Valley club house was opened yesterday, all the cottagers and many of the hotel guests being present. There was a brilliant display of fireworks, a banquet and dancing. Secretary and Mrs. Blaine arrived last evening.
