#### Four Suits for Libel.

Another chapter in the Centre Iron Company's controversy has begun. Four civil suits for libel have been entered on the docket against James Milliken by Beaver, Gephart and Dale and Orvis Bower as attorneys for Robert, Abram Jacob and George Valentine, each claiming damages to the extent of \$25,000.

The suits are the outcome of a letter that appeared in a Philadelphia news- Co paper of November 7 relating to the selling of the furnace, ground and ore rights by them to the Centre Iron Company, the letter claiming the sale was a swin-

# Governor Beaver Sued.

The administrators of the late Thornton Conrow entered suit against Governor Beaver and J. W. Gebhart, of the law firm of Beaver & Gebbart of Bellefonte, to recover some \$4000, with interest from 1884, which was lost through alleged negligence of the firm. They state that in 1881 Mr. Conrow sold to John Ardel, Jr, of Bellefonte, thirteen tracts of timber land in Centre county and in part payment for it received fifteen bonds of \$500 each, secured by a mortgage upon the property.

Subsequently seven of these bonds were paid, and the remaining eight bonds, valued at \$4000, were placed in the hands of Beaver & Gebhart to be collected in the latter part of 1884 or January. 1885. The plaintiffs allege that the bonds were not collected and that some time after Ardel failed, the lands were sold for the non-payment of taxes in 1889, and the mortage became worthless. The plaintiffs claim that the law firm were responsible for this loss .- Ph. Record.
