A Bellefonte Lady Loses her Life in a Pe-

A very singular and at the same time sad accident occurred at Howard, on Saturday evening. Mrs. Jenkins, wife of W. R. Jenkins, the senior member of the firm of Jenkins & Lingle, of Belles fonte, drove to Howard on Saturday afternoon with the intention of spending the night with a friend, Mrs. McKinney. who keeps a millinery store. After supper Mrs. McKinney and Mrs. Jenkins were talking together, when the former had to leave her guest for a few minutes to attend to some customers in the store. Mrs. Jenkins, instead of remaining in the room until her friend returned, wandered into the yard.

When Mrs. McKinney returned to the room she found her guest gone, and, after waiting some time, she instituted a search for her in the adjoining houses. No trace of Mrs, Jenkins could be found, uatil one of the searchers found a white handkerchief lying at the edge of the well in Mrs. McKinney's tack yard. A lantern was procured and by its weak light, the body of the missing woman was seen floating on top of the water in the well, which contained about thirty feet of water and was fifty feet deep.

A rope was procured and a man degended and the lifeless body of Mrs. Jenkins brought to the surface. An exa amination showed that her neck had been broken by the fall and that death had resulted almost instantaneously. She had evidently missed her footing in some unaccountable manner and fallen headlong into the well. Mr. Jenkins was in his office at Bellefonte when the news of his wife's death reached him, and he immediately left for Howard.

How to Save Your Fruit.

The worm which destroys all fruit takes germ at the time of fruit bloseoming by repeated stinging of the heart of the flower by certain insects which there deposit an egg. Afterward the egg is converted into a worm, which is nourished by the pulp of the fruit. These insects, it seems, fear the odor of vinegar, and it is sufficient to drive them away and even destroy them, to water lightly acidulated with vinegar; it might be one-tenth vinegar. This process, recommended and approved in France by the agricultural department, has given wonderful results. The trees treated thus have remained covered with fruit whilst others have scarcely borne any fruit. Those who have but a few crees can easily experiment with a pump such as gardeners use for sprinkling plants.
