Gentleness, paience, christian charity and purity ofheart characterize his life, even the worldly minded were led to remark that nothing but the grace of God could mould a life like his, but at last the end came, "Uncle Billy," as he was familiarly called by all who knew him, had finished his work, and sleep, his willing spirit was released from its frail worn tenement of clay to join the spirits of the just made perfect in Heaven.
