Christ's First Disciples.

LESSON TEXT. (John 1: 29-42. Memory verses: 40-42.)

LESSON PLAN.

TOPIC OF THE QUARTER: Jesus the Son of God.

GOLDEN TEXT FOR THE QUARTER. These are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name.—John 20: 31.

LESSON TOPIC: The Son Manifested to Men.

GOLDEN TEXT: Behold the Lamb of God, which taken away the sin of the world.—John 1: 29.

DAILY HOME READINGS.

M.—John 1: 29-42. The Son manifested to men. T.—John 1: 43-51. Further manifestations.

LESSON ANALYSIS.

I. MANIFESTED BY DIVINE ATTESTATION. 1. The Descending Spirit: I have beheld the Spirit descending...

II. THE APPROVING FATHER: He that saith me... said, ... The same is he (33). The Lord said unto me, Thou art my son (Ps. 2: 7).

III. THE SUPREME GIFT: He... baptizeth with the Holy Spirit (33). He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost (Matt. 3: 11).

IV. MANIFESTED BY FAITHFUL DECLARATION. 1. Exalting Jesus: The Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world (29).

2. "The same is he." (1) What was expected of the Messiah; (2) What was realized in Jesus.—(1) An appointed token; (2) A clear demonstration.

III. Continuing Steadfast: Again on the morrow John... saith, Behold the Lamb of God (35, 36). He that endureth to the end, the same shall be saved (Matt. 10: 22).

IV. MANIFESTED BY PERSONAL FELLOWSHIP. Following After Jesus: Two disciples heard him speak, and they followed Jesus (37). Follow me. And he rose, and followed (Matt. 9: 9).

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My sheep hear my voice;... and they follow me (John 10: 27).

II. Communing with Jesus: Jesus... saith unto them... And they said unto him (38).

Our heart burning within us, while he spake to us (Luke 24: 32).

They marvelled that he was speaking with a woman (John 4: 27).

Speaking the things concerning the kingdom of God (Acts 1: 3).

I will... sup with him, and he with me (Rev. 3: 20).

III. Abiding with Jesus: And they abode with him that day (39).

They came... and saw where he abode (John 1: 39).

Abide in me, and I in you (John 15: 4).

If a man abide not in me, he is cast forth (John 15: 6).

We know that he abideth in us, by the Spirit (1 John 3: 24).

1. "They followed Jesus." (1) The initial influence; (2) The decisive act; (3) The resulting life.

2. "Come and ye shall see." (1) Invitation; (2) Assurance.—(1) The call; (2) The response; (3) The result.

3. "We have found the Messiah." (1) A blessed discovery; (2) A wise proclamation; (3) A saving message.

LESSON BIBLE READING.

SYMBOLISM OF THE LAMB.

Any cherished object (2 Sam. 12: 1-6). Weak believers (Isa. 40: 11; John 21: 15).

Believers at in the world (Luke 10: 2). Believers generally (Isa. 5: 17; 11: 6). God's foes (Ps. 37: 20; Jer. 51: 40). Christ's purity (Exod. 12: 5; 1 Pet. 1: 19).

Christ's patience (Isa. 53: 7; Acts 8: 32). Christ's sacrifice (John 1: 29, 35, 36; Rev. 5: 6).

LESSON SURROUNDINGS.

INTERESTING EVENTS.—Jesus comes to the Jordan to be baptized by John; is recognized by him; then after baptism there comes a divine attestation in bodily form, and by a voice out of the heaven. Jesus is led by the Spirit into the wilderness; he fasts forty days, and is tempted by Satan, three specific attacks being narrated by Matthew and Luke. He returns to where John was baptizing. Priests and Levites are sent from Jerusalem to inquire of John "who art thou?" After several negative answers, he declares himself to be "the voice of one crying in the wilderness," the forerunner of the Messiah. He justifies his baptism, but tells that there is one standing among them far more worthy than he. The lesson begins with what happened on the day after this declaration was made.

PLACE.—In Bethany (or, Beth-abara), beyond Jordan. See last lesson surroundings.

TIME.—Probably about seven weeks after the baptism of Jesus; that is, at the close of February, A. U. C. 780, — A. D. 27.

PERSONS.—John the Baptist and Jesus; two disciples of John, one of them Andrew, and the other almost certainly John the evangelist, who never names himself; Simon, the brother of Andrew.

INCIDENTS.—John sees Jesus coming, and points him out as the Lamb of God, declaring that this was of whom he had spoken, and that his own mission was to make him manifest. He repeats the story of the divine attestation at the baptism of Jesus, bearing witness himself that this is the Son of God. The next day John repeats his testimony about Jesus as the Lamb of God in the presence of two of his disciples. These follow Jesus, who turns and questions them. They go with him to where he abode. One of them, Andrew finds his brother Simon, and tells him they have found the Messiah. When brought to Jesus by Andrew, he is given the new name Cephas, which is by interpretation, Peter; that is, "rock," or "stone."

There is no parallel passage.

How Raisins are Made.

California is now making extensive experiments in the grape-growing districts to ascertain the best methods of drying grapes for raisins. Two methods are now practiced. In one the bunch stems are cut about half through and the grapes allowed to dry on the vine; in the other, the bunch is removed from the vine and the grapes dried in a drying house over a fire.

The former produces the best raisins, but a great many are lost through the breaking of the stem by wind, when the bunch falls and is damaged; by the latter a quality of raisins is produced which will compare favorably with any European or Asiatic product. When the bunches are quite dry they are dipped in a weak solution of lye made of wood ashes, a little salt being dissolved in the solution; they are again dried and packed. Such success has been attained in the drying that not many years will elapse ere California will supply this country with all the raisins it needs.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
