Chillie has an unpleasantness on hand with Uncle Sam. A mob in Valparaiso killed and wounded American citizens belonging to the steamer Baltimore. Satisfaction has been demanded by the United States and a man-of-war has been ordered to Chile.

Governor Pattison was struck on the back of the head on Saturday, by a stray shot fired by a member of the Harrisburg Gun Club. He was shooting at a clay pigeon, and hit a Governor. Fortunately the shot merely grazed the executive caput.

If Auditor General Gregg will not allow the state robbers to control him, he will maintain his good name, and have higher honors awaiting him. The pledge was made before the election that Gen. Gregg would not be under the influence of the bosses, and that kept the votes of thousands of honest Republicans from drifting to Wright.

Cluny Castle, Andrew Carnegie's much talked about Scotch estate, is a large building of gray stone, surrounded by about eleven thousand acres of land, well stocked with game. Fuller details received in regard to the telegram received at the Russian Embassy here, announcing that a ukase was to be issued to-day prohibiting the export of all cereals excepting wheat, show that the order referred to will also prohibit the export of potatoes and all products from the prohibited cereals. As already announced, though the ukase prohibits the exportation of all cereals excepting wheat from to-day, vessels still loading will be allowed to complete their cargo, provided they sail within three days.

A member of the English parliament who is visiting in this country has an opinion about the Chilian trouble. He says the United States would be soundly thrashed by Chili in the first days of the war, but, he kindly concedes, the United States would be eventually successful. Then he goes onto say he would like to hear our howl after the first round. That blarsted Britisher has doubtless read in history something of how this country, when young and weak, walloped England a couple of times. But we have no notion of allowing Chili to wallop us or make us howl even in the first of the trouble. We will not do any business with Chili until we are good and ready to do her up. THE ELECTIONS.

PENNSYLVANIA AND OHIO REPUBLICAN.

New York, Massachusetts, Maryland and Virginia Largely Democratic.

IOWA CLAIMED BY THE DEMOCRATS.

Pennsylvania goes Republican by about 30,000, which is over 40,000 less than Harrison had.

Philadelphia gives 20,000 Republican majority.

Many counties in the state show large Democratic gains.

Allegheny gives 14000 Republican majority.

N.Y.

New York elects a Democratic Governor by from 30,000 to 40,000. The city gave 58,000 Democratic majority.

O.H.

McKinley's election is claimed by 12,000.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Governor Russel, Democrat, is reelected in Massachusetts by about 4000 majority.

COLORADO.

There were five tickets in the field, Democratic, Republican, Prohibition, People's and Non-Partisan. The first two following the vote the other three having little show. No state officers were voted for except for chief justice of the supreme court, which the Republicans carry by 5000.

IOWA.

In this old Republican stronghold the election turns out close, with the Democrats claiming the state.

MARYLAND.

The Democrats have swept the state by 20,000.

VIRGINIA.

In Virginia the Democrats gain everything, and the Republicans have nothing.

Latest makes New York Democratic by over 45,000.

NEW JERSEY

Also went Democratic.

Later returns show the Democrats carried Iowa by 8000.

McKinley has only 10,000 in Ohio.

The latest estimate gives McClure 181 majority in Union county, 200 majority in Snyder county and 150 majority in Mifflin county.

The majority of McClure over Bucher, in Snyder, is 400. In Mifflin McClure has 75 majority.

Judge Bucher Defeated.

Judge Bucher was defeated in his district by about 500 majority. A very determined fight was made against him; the district is Republican, but he carried it twice before this. He had been nominated for a third term.

Altho defeated by 500, Judge Bucher can feel proud of his run, the district being about 2000 Republican. Harold McClure, of Sunbury, will be the new judge.

Quay's Libel Suits.

The Pittsburgh Post says it is ready to meet Quay in a suit for libel for printing the Bardsey certificate, The Post bluntly remarks:

It seems to us the senator is a little late in waking up to the realities. The New York World some months ago gave him his choice of tribunals and offered to pay his counsel fees if he would go into court and challenge the exposure it made of the treasury embezzlement of 1880, settled by Senator Cameron. Scores of other leading papers of the Union of all parties printed the same terrible arraignment, and challenged Quay to the test of the truth. But he made no sign.

A leading congressman of his own party, on the floor of congress, in a prepared speech repeated the charge, and it went on the records of the government. Quay shrank from investigation. A little later because of these enormousities in his public and private career, the leading journals of his own party, representing its highest type of political intelligence and morality, demanded he should be deposed from the chairmanship of the national committee. He escaped the disgrace of expulsion by resigning.

Lake Michigan is drying up, say Chicago advices, viz: Lake Michigan is drying up, and one-fourth of this city will be without a water supply in twenty-four hours if it continues to fall below city datum as rapidly as it has in the past day or two. The inlet pipes are only two feet below city datum, and the surface of the lake is not fifteen inches below that mark, which is the lowest point ever reached. If the lake falls a few inches further the river into which the drainage pours will run back into the lake and contaminate the water supply of the whole city. No cause can be ascribed for the strange depression of the water.

Rev. Stewart McCoy, a prominent Episcopal minister of Omaha, electrified his audience on Sunday in a sermon in which he pronounced in favor of opening the World's Fair on Sunday, and characterized the opposition to the idea as a hundred years behind the times.

Chairman Kerr has sent Quay word he is ready.
