A MANIAC'S SUICIDE.

Saturated Himself with Oil and Rolled on Live Coals.

Rolled on Live Coals. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 17.—John T. Ruddy, whose mind has been un-balanced for some time, took advantage of his brother's absence from the house to carry out an inexpressibly fiendish purpose, of which he himself was the victim. Escaping from the room in which he had been confined he secured a carving knife and slashed his throat twice twice.

The wound was rough and jagged, but did not reach the jugular vein. Leav-ing a trail of blood behind him from kitchen to shed he went down the steps kitchen to shed he went down the steps and poured coal oil over his clothes, completely saturating them. He then returned up stairs, the oil dripping from his clothes, and shoveled the live coals out of the stove, scattering them over the floor. As the smoke began to rise he lay down and rolled across the floor. Instantly he was a mass of flames. Neighbors who had seen the smoke rushed in, but too late to save him.

The fire in the house was extinguished with some pails of water, but all that remained of Ruddy was what resembled a charred log. The younger brother, Anthony, had gone down town to bring up a physician, as the authorities had promised that the brother should at once be removed to the asylum at Dan-

A Juvenile Murderer.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17 .- James Wood, colored, aged 10, was committed to await the action of the coroner, on the charge of having killed Mrs. Emma Hackvania. On July 13 Wood and two companions, Kennard Pearce and William Burk, purchased a goat of Mrs. Hackvania. After the purchase they decided that they did not want the goat, and asked her to take it back. She refused to return the money, when Wood, who carried a small rifle, aimed at the woman and pulled the trigger. The ball took effect in the woman's head, and she died a week later. Pearce and Burk were arrested at the time, but Wood escaped. He was recently located on a New Jersey farm.

WEST CHESTER, Pa., Nov. 14 .- Tramps are coming into their winter quarters at the Chester County Home in droves. A week ago the inmates of the home numbered less than one hundred. Now there are nearly two hundred of them. The approach of cold weather is driving them in, and daily from ten to twenty-five come in. These men are quartered in a large outbuilding and their only labor is the gathering of firewood for warming their quarters. Early in the spring they take their leave and begin their wander-ings. It is a remarkable fact that nearly the same faces are seen in the "tramp house" year after year.

Fatal Freight Wreck.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 17 .- A fatal rear end collision between two Panhandle freight trains occurred just west of Burgettstown, about twenty miles west of this city, late yesterday afternoon. Four-teen cars of perishable freight, with the caboose and engine of the second train, were derailed and piled in a heap, the cars of wreckage taking fire and burn-ing up. Brakeman Hardy, of this city, was caught in the wreck and cremated alive. Thomas Whitesides, engineer, and John McFarland, fireman, received fatal internal injuries before being res-cued from the burning debris. The loss will reach \$100,000.

Emmet Pays the Fines.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 16 .- Joseph K. Emmet, son of the German comedian, and twenty-two others, including Manager E. D. Wilt of the Grand Opera house and nineteen cabmen, who were arrested for violating a Sunday law, were given a hearing before Justice Ayndman and fined \$28.40 each. The offense consisted of a parade of twenty-five cabs, on which were large boxes announcing Mr. Em-met's appearance at the Grand Opera house this week. Mr. Emmet paid all the fines, amounting to nearly \$600.

A Poor House Waif's Sad Death. CARLISLE, Pa., Nov. 13 .- Quite a sensation has been produced by the death of the lad alleged to have been beaten to death by John Lafferty at Idaville, Adams county, just across the Cumber-land county line. A trial for murder will probably be the result. The body of the boy showed a number of bruises, and there is little doubt that death was

caused by a cruel beating at the hands of the farmer. The boy is the son of a poor woman of this place, and was taken from the almshouse by Lafferty.

Bentley's Bonanza Blocked.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., Nov. 14 .- Thomas Bentley, colored, who has been going about collecting money for two colored churches-one at Jenkintown, the other at Hatboro—has been committed to an-swer for alleged false representations. Bentley, it is alleged, was not authorized to collect funds. He carried two subscription books, one for each church, and, it is said, appropriated to his own use the money he collected.


