Little Girl Burned to Death.

About 2 o'clock on Saturday morning the 2nd inst., the dwelling house of Charles Bassett, at Jersey Shore, Lycoming county, was destroyed by fire and a little daughter of Mr. Bassett, aged about 7 years, perished in the flames. Mr. Bassett, who is a passenger engineer on the Beech Creek railroad, was away from home when the fire occurred and his family was alone in the house. They awoke in time to make their escape, but the little girl, it is supposed, became bewildered and entered a room, where the fire was raging instead of going toward an outer door, and after the flames were subdued the charred remains of the poor child were found in the ruins. One arm was completely burned off.
