THE Swiss Government proposes to assume proprietorship of the manufacture of matches, the plan being to purchase the various works now in operation. It is estimated that this will cost upwards of \$200,000, and the Government expects to make an annual profit of about \$125,000 on the business.

A LOVER of the curious in numbers has figured out some interesting facts concerning the city of Berlin. The city has 210 miles of streets, so that a person might walk ten days in the German capital without going up or down the same street twice. If the 1,400,000 inhabitants were to turn out at a grand review and march in double file, they would form a line 750 miles in length, a column long enough to reach nearly entirely across France. If the citizens should all determine to start on a journey. on the same day and at the same time. all the cars in Germany would accommodate but two-thirds of their number. If formed in a single file, each with his hand on the other's shoulder, the column would be nearly 2000 miles long. If separated until only within speaking distance of each other, the column would be a human telegraph line long enough to reach from Berlin to Calcutta, India.

DR. JASTROW, in a paper in The New Review, records some experiments he has been making with various individuals in order to discover what words and ideas are the most common. He set twentyfive men and twenty-five women to write down as quickly as possible the first hundred words which came into their minds. Out of these 5,000 words he finds 2.024 different, some of the words being commonly used many times in the fifty lists of words. He finds also that women are more inclined than men to use the same words as one another, and that their ideas, as we might, perhaps, naturally suppose, run greatly on articles of dress.

THE Japanese exhibit at the Chicago Fair will be both attractive and instructive. It is to consist of works of art and mechanism, flowers and fruits, table dainties, domestic and personal ornaments, living pigs, horses, fowls, acrobats and wrestlers, besides other things too numerous to mention and too marvelous to be described. The Japanese are always striving to introduce their products into foreign countries, and are proverbially expert in commercial transactions.

A LOCAL paper says that the sprucegum season is on in Maine and business is booming. One firm received 24 barre's, bout 24 tons, of gum in one day, and it will have 125 barrels, or 25,000 pounds before the close of the season. The first grade of gum is clean and clear and ready for chewing. It sells at wholesale at 60 cents to \$1 a pound. The dark colored gum, mixed with bark and pitch. is worth from 6 to 18 cents a pound, and is purchased by refiners, who boil it, and produce many varieties of sprucegum. Is it be true, as stated, that all the available wheat lands of the United States have been taken up, and that we have reached the maximum of production, and if it be true that the population of the United States is increasing at the rate of 5 per cent. every ten years, as is also authoritatively stated, then it must be evident that we are nearing a time when the country will consume all its own wheat product and have none for exportation. These facts stare us in the face and promise to enhance the value of everything produced from the soil. THE Meteorological Department of the Indian government has recently published the results of an inquiry into the nature and course of storms in the Arabian Sea. These researches apparently show that the cyclones are formed on the northern limits of the southwest monsoon. When the northern limits of the monsoon reach the land, and when the northeast monsoon extends from Asia to the equator, no great storm is generated in the Arabian Sea. The results of this inquiry are important in showing that the real cause of the cyclones is to be sought in the conflict of the regular southwest monsoon current with the opposing northerly currents moving from the Asiatic continent toward the Equator. According to the prevailing theory, cyclones are generated where there are great vertical differences of temperature, giving rise to ascending currents. There are, however, no evidences of the existence of such conditions in the Arabian Sea at the periods of the maximum stormincss. NEXT to the United States, the country to which there is the largest immigration of Europeans in these times is Brazil. Notwithstanding all the disturbances of the past year in Brazil, ship-loads of steerage passengers have, according to the New York Sun, been put ashore every week at Bahia, Rio and other ports on the eastern seaboard. We judge by the roturns thus far received that the year's immigration will ran up to 200,-000, mostly from Italy, portugal and Spain. The republican Government holds out even greater inducements to immigrants than were held out by the Government of Dom Pedro. It pays a proportion of their passage money; it gives them land on easy terms; it promises to provide them with employment, and it relieves them from military service for a term of years. Over SO, 000 Italians have taken advantage of these terms the past year, and the Govcrament, amid all the troubles and changes of the times, has striven to keep the promises made to them. It is a curious fact that while there were many German immigrants to Brazil during the reign of Dom Pedro, German immigration has almost entirely stopped since the setting up of the unsettled republic.
