RELIGIOUS DODIES.

### The Roman Catholic Church First in Numerical Strength.

Charles E. Buell, chief of the division of religious statistics of the forthcoming United States census reports, has finished his labors. His general report is the first one authorized by Congress, and contains the returns of the denominations in America. The total membership is 20,347,364, with church property valued at \$646,125,904. The Roman Catholic church ranks first in numerical strength, embracing 6,240,046 communicants. The Roman Catholic church property is valued at \$118,000,000. The Methodist Episcopal church is next, with a membership of 2,230,354, and with church property aggregating in value \$69,000,000.


In the southern part of the United States there are numbered in 'the Methodist Episcopal faith 1,250,000 persons, and the property belonging to the church reaches the sum of \$19,-000,000. Other and smaller bodies of Methodists aggregate 4,000,000 members. The Baptists are third, 3,000,000 strong, and next come the colored denominations, with a total membership of 3,000,000, and a church property valuation of \$30,000,000. The Presbyterians are fourth in number. The Protestant Episcopal denomination, while numbering only 500,000 persons, has the most property per capita, aggregating \$79,000,000.

The valuation of church property by census agents does not include schools, parsonages or any feature excepting the edifices and the sites upon which they are built. Of Hebrews there are 150,000. The Quakers number 100,000. Mr. Buell says that the church of the Latter Day Saints is increasing rapidly in membership, numbering now 66,000 and owning church property valued at \$10,000,000.

## No Desire to Repeat It.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14-Superintendent Troy, of the railway mail service, who had charge of the train which carried \$20,000,000 in gold from the federal sub-treasury in San Francisco to the sub-treasury New York, arrived to-day. He says he has no desire to repeat the experiences of the trip, and he is of the opinion that the government will not try it again. The publication of the fact that the train had started increased the danger that robbers might attack or attempt to wreck the train, and necessitated increased viligance. The result was the loss of many hours' sleep.





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

## Election Pointers.

Here are a few little pointers, which in view of the coming election, are timely:

All nominations of candidates to be All nominations of candidates to be voted on the general or local tickets in November next must be certified to the State Department at Harrisburg on or before the 13th of September on or before the 13th of September. All nominations not thus certified can't be printed on the uniform tickets to be voted by all at the election.

Every otherwise qualified voter, excepting those who will vote on agebecause between 21 and 22 years of age on election day-must be assessed on or before the 8th of September. unless they were assessed last year.

All who have not paid a state or county tax within two years must pay such tax on an assessment made within two years on or before the 8th of October.

Failure to file nominations in time practically defeats the candidates whose names are not thus filed, and failure to be assessed forfeits the right to vote, and the failure to pay state or county tax within two years also disfranchises the citizen.

State Encampment.




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
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
