



### ----Cloud Burst in Texas.

ALPINE, TEX, was nearly swept away by a terrible cloud burst which formed over Devil Mountains, six miles south of town, on Sunday. The water rushed down the mountains in huge volumes, tearing up trees by their roots and dashing everything in front of it to death. It ran all over the city, being from three to four feet deep.

Large trees were torn up by the roots. Burros, heavy timbers, cattle and horses that floated through the town gave plain evidence of the havoc in the mountains. The ranger's camp, four miles south of town, in a narrow canon, must have been washed away, as relics were seen floating through the town. Mexicans fled from their homes to the low mountains near town and a general panic prevailed. Considerable damage was done the railroad tracks. Dean's ranch, above high water mark, 25 miles south of town, was washed away, the houses being torn down.


